Superintendent Armstrong Is sues Notice As To Children Entering Next Year

The enrollment and physical examination of children entering school for the first time next September will Bradshaw, J. Beck Thompson, N. W. take place Tuesday, May 15 at Virginia street school and on Thesday, May 22 at Walnut street school.

Olvildren who will he sx years ald before January 1, 1929 will be eligible to this class.

"We want to urge parents to attend to this at this time and to re which usually occurs when this is de layed until September " said City Superintendent Ray Armstrong "We wish to call especial attention to the physical examination which will take place at the same time. We believe if each child entering school is examined now and physical defects cor rected during the summer the attendance of first grade children will be greatly improved. A high percentage of attendance is essential to a child in the first grade if he is to make progress not only in his first year but all through the grades. This fact is very often overlooked So be fair with him and see that he has a good start physically.

"The doctors and nurses of the town have very kindly consented to give us their services on these two days and we hope that each child will have the advantage that this clinic for pre-school children offers,"
