CHARLOTTE, June 3-(AP)-A sec end primary appeared virtually certain in the race for the Democratic nomination for L'attenant Governor at one o'clock this morning.

With alightly more than one third of the state reported R. T. Foun-3407 over John D. Langston of Goldsboro and 3645 over W. H. S. Burgwyn of Northampton county.

The vote in \$92 precincts out 1754 in the state was Fountain 25,26 Langston 21,855, Burgwyn 21,617.

Should the vote continue at the came ratio, as that reported to this FLIERS READY hour the total for the state appears I'kely to be not more than 180,000 and it appeared doubtful that any candidate can gain enough to overcome the prospective vote of both opponents. The vote at this hour came from 62 counties; Frank D. Grist incumbent was continuing to lead his two opponents by a clear majority for Commissioner of Labor and Printing.
