COL. LANGSTON SECOND AND GAINING EARLY TODAY

Race For Lieutenant Governor Is Close As Tabulations Come In

Early This Morning Fountain Had 46,826, Langston 41,751 Burgwyn 38,153

VOTING GENERALLY IS VERY LIGHT IN STATE

Langston Had Not Heard From Most of Own District As Counting Went On

Tabulations compiled by the Associated Press at its Charlotte office early this morning showed that 885 precincts out of the state's 1754 gave R. T. Fountain of Rocky Mount 46,826 votes, Col. John D. Langston of Goldsboro 41,751, and Burgwyn 38,153.

Of the precincts which had not been heard from over the State a number which were expected to show strength for Langston had not reported.

"I have not heard from a good part of my Congressional district," said Col. Langston.

In Wayne county 9 precincts which are sure to give a very heavy majority for Langston had not been tabulated.

Second Primary Seen

CHARLOTTE, June 3—(AP)—A second primary appeared virtually certain in the race for the Democratic nomination for Lieutenant Governor at one o'clock this morning.

With slightly more than one third of the state reported R. T. Fountain of Rocky Mount had a lead of 3407 over John D. Langston of Goldsboro and 3845 over W. H. S. Burgwyn of Northampton county.

The vote in 892 precincts out of 1754 in the state was Fountain 25,265, Langston 21,855, Burgwyn 21,617.

Should the vote continue at the same ratio, as that reported to this hour the total for the state appears likely to be not more than 180,000 and it appeared doubtful that any candidate can gain enough to overcome the prospective vote of both opponents. The vote at this hour came from 62 counties; Frank D. Grist incumbent was continuing to lead his two opponents by a clear majority for Commissioner of Labor and Printing. The vote in 536 precincts was Grist 37,943; Shipman 22,017; Peterson 11,157.

CHARLOTTE, June 3—(AP)—R. T. Fountain of Rocky Mount continued to lead in the race for Lieutenant Governor in yesterday's Democratic primary by 2,493 votes over John D. Langston of Goldsboro and 3,221 over W. H. S. Burgwyn of Northampton county when 645 of the state's 1754 precincts had reported at 2 o'clock this morning.

The vote Fountain 27,840; Langston 25,347; Burgwyn 24,519; Frank D. Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing continued his majority over both of his opponents with 588 precincts had reported. The vote: Grist 37,943; Shipman 22,017; Peterson 11,157.

CHARLOTTE, June 2—(AP)—A tight vote due to the small number of state wide races today featured the North Carolina Democratic primaries at which candidates for the November election were nominated.

Frank D. Grist of Lenoir, Commissioner of Labor and Printing, with about one third of the state reported four hours after the polls closed was leading both of his opponents by a clear majority or around 4,000.

In the race for Lieutenant Governor early indications were that a second primary would be necessary with the race so close between the three candidates that it looked like anybody's race.

The vote for Commissioner of Labor and Printing in 510 precincts was Grist 30,915; M. L. Shipman of Raleigh, former commissioner, 18,630; O. J. Peterson, Pittsboro editor, 8,761.

Sermon This Evening Will Launch High Commencement

The Goldsboro high school commencement exercises begin in full swing this evening at 8 o'clock when Rev. John Arch McMillan, alumni secretary of Wake Forest College, delivers the baccalaureate sermon to the graduating class in the new high school auditorium. There are fifty-one members of the class this spring, thirty-four of them being girls and seventeen boys.

The exercises tonight will be the first of their kind held in connection with the Goldsboro high school commencement; heretofore, the exercises had been of only two forms, the Class Day program and the Graduation event. The baccalaureate sermon will add a real touch of commencement and especially will the program tonight be of interest. Dr. McMillan has won himself a place in the hearts of all who know him and his fellowship with the boys at Wake Forest has been that of a real friend. He is gifted with the ease of talking to young people, his language being of the simplest style, yet full of real thought.

The exercises tomorrow morning and evening will be of much interest. The seniors have planned the Class Day to appeal to all, Ed Howell, president of the class, will assume the leadership and during the course of the exercises the class will unfold to its audience the secrets of its success. William Cuddington, winner of the Royal prize, will read the winning essay, the title of which is "My Experiences as a Hitch-hiker." The fifty-one seniors have been practicing every day on songs, the composers of which are members of the class.

The high water mark of the commencement exercises will be on Monday night when the members of the University, delivers the annual address to the graduates. Mr. Coates is a pleasing speaker and is spoken of highly by those who have heard him. Diplomas to those finishing their high school work will be presented by Mr. George Dewey, chairman of the School board.

Special arrangements have been made for seating those who attend the different exercises. In addition to the benches put in the auditorium by the Manual Training department last fall there are comfortable places for many. The total seating capacity of the auditorium during the commencement programs will be a thousand.

The seniors are anxious that all of their exercises be well attended.

An interesting feature of the commencement is the use of the unfinished auditorium. The students have been using the room for a whole year, and for sometime it has been planned to hold the graduation exercises there. The seniors were very much in favor of its use, so the auditorium will be used for the Commencement this year for the first time. Marshals have been elected to care for the visitors and effort will be made to seat all who attend.

COURT IS TO CONVENE MON.

Seventy-Eight Cases Are Docketed For Trial In Wayne Superior Tribunal

Seventy-eight cases are docketed for trial in Wayne County court for the trial of criminal cases which begins a one week term here Monday morning. Judge R. A. Nunn, of New Bern, will preside over the session. It will be the first court he has held since the Lawrence case in Pittsboro which ended Friday.

Judge Nunn was scheduled to have held Civil court here the past week, but the Lawrence trial running over into the past week prevented his being present. Cases in civil court scheduled for the past week will be continued until the next session, it was indicated.

Of the seventy-eight cases docketed for trial twenty-three are for alleged violations of the prohibition law in some form or the other. Every third case, then has to do with violation of the whiskey law.

One of the cases down which will receive most public interest is that against Henry Godwin and Mrs. Elsie Jones, who were found registered at a St. Louis hotel after a wide search had been conducted for them. The page of the court docket where the names of the two are listed was left blank as it was prepared for Solicitor Clawson Williams. The latter will determine what the charge will be, it was said.

LIN ABANDONS CITY OF PEKING

Victorious Nationalists Will Now Advance To Claim Capital As Own

PEKING, China, June 3—(AP)—Chang Tso Lin, for two years ruler of Peking and Northern China renounced his power and left the ancient capital at 1:15 o'clock this morning. He departed on a special train which had his old stronghold at Mukden Manchuria for its destination.

Chang sent members of his household on ahead of himself. A bodyguard and small retinue traveled in a pilot train which proceeded that in which the ex-dictator rode. He left behind a committee of elders in charge of the city and issued a farewell message expressing the hope that China would survive the civil war and the threat of Communism.

KERR IS LEADING BY BIG MAJORITY

ADDITIONAL PURCHASES

WASHINGTON, June 3—(AP)—Purchase of 250 tracts of land aggregating 173,000 acres for additions to National Forests in the Eastern Lake and Southern states has been authorized by the National forest reservation commission.

Royall Has Slight Lead

Hood Leads Entire County Ticket With 2416 Votes; Ransy Leads Commissioners

GRANT RE-NOMINATED AS WAYNE SHERIFF

Robinson Wins; Andrews Shows Good Strength; Returns Are Not Yet Complete

Kenneth C. Royall has a majority for the nomination for State Senator from Wayne, Guffey F. Hood and W. Wiley Andrews are apparently nominated for representatives from Wayne. T. R. Robinson again gets the nomination for Coroner, and W. D. Grant for sheriff, such very deductions which made from incomplete official returns early today by The News. Yesterday's primary was so close so the county has seen and brought out a heavy vote, high men on the ticket getting as many as 3400 votes and over, with several other precincts to be heard from.

For county commissioner, the nominations were still in doubt, something one place won by L. A. Ransy, chairman of the present board, who led the ticket with 2180 votes. Following in the order of their strength, according to the incomplete returns at hand, showed Berger, a member of the present board, coming second with 1780 votes and G. W. Williams, another member of the present board, third with 1697. J. R. Martin, News Springs merchant followed with 1610 votes, and J. Herman Denning of Grantham township with 1510 votes. The News tabulation showed 1510 for Denning, but other tabulations indicated 1563.

A. T. Griffin Goldsboro Manufacturer, was pushing J. H. Denning close by for the fifth place on the ticket, in need if not the fifth in order. The News tabulation showed 1545 for Mr. Griffin from the incomplete returns at hand.

The Goldsboro precincts saved Kenneth C. Royall from a telling defeat at the hands of J. J. Hall. The majority of the rural boxes gave Hatch the most of the votes and Mr. Olive aided his total. Goldsboro wards gave sufficient majorities to Royall to overcome the handicap, and The News tabulation indicated 2180 for Royall and 1915 for Hatch.

However, figures issued from the office of Mr. Royall claimed only a majority of 100 for the incumbent, setting forth totals of 3202 for Royall and 3102 for Hatch.

J. W. Bird of Mt. Olive developed considerable strength against W. D. Grant for sheriff but the latter won the nomination by a good majority. T. R. Robinson, incumbent had 1523 vote for coroner against 831 for S. F. Winstead.

Gurey P. Hood, Goldsboro businessman, and W. Wiley Andrews, 501 farm, were consistent leaders in the race for nominations for the State legislature, and the final showed Hood 2416 the highest vote on the ticket, Andrews 2063, Harrison Yelverton incumbent 1662 and A. W. Byrd 1626.

TO SEARCH FOR LOST ITALIA

Crew Desires To Take Advantage of the Favorable Weather

KINKS BAY, Spitzbergen, June 2—(AP)—Fasting here only a few hours, the ice breaker Braganza sailed at 8 o'clock tonight for the north on a search for the missing dirigible Italia and the 18 explorers of General Umberto Nobile's polar expedition. The steamer, which is one of the best ice boats in Norway, hopes to reach Mresel Bay through Hinlopen strait if ice conditions permit.
