New Record Holder

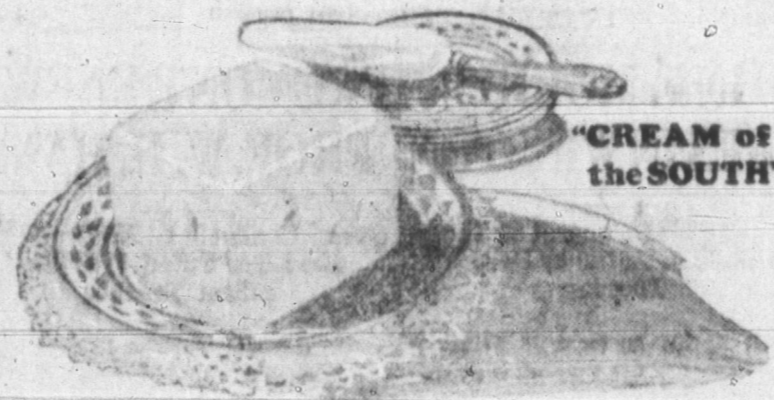
