CHARGES SOUTHERN MILL LABOR IS EXPLOITED

Southern Industrial Council Statement Is Issued At Baltimore

Shows That Average Mill Hand in South Makes Only \$12.17 for 55.7 hrs.

STRIKE ORGANIZER IS ARRESTED FOR FRAUD

Headquarters of Strikers at Gastonia Demolished by Band of Masked Men

BALTIMORE, April 18.—(AP)—Southern labor is being exploited to its greatest detriment in the textile industry now torn by strike in North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee it was declared in a report issued today by the Southern Industrial Council, Broadus Mitchell, Baltimore. The report declares that the present strikes are the results of these conditions and the true significance of the trouble lies in the fact that this labor exploitation be brought to the attention of the public. Recent migration of textile interest from the north to the south has been based on the low labor standards, the report declares, and says that the immediate causes of the strikes are of less moment than the fundamental complaint of exploitation. The average wage for the Southern cotton mill-workers based on the 1925 Federal census is \$632.95, a year or \$12.17 per average working week of 55.5 working hours, the report says.

CHARLOTTE, April 18.—(AP)—Ellen Dawson, communist organizer for the National Textile Workers Union, who has been acting in the Carolinas for the last six weeks, was arrested at Gastonia late today on a charge of securing naturalization papers, by fraud. She was brought to Charlotte by Deputy United States Marshal M. C. Cain and given an immediate hearing before U. S. Commissioner W. S. Huggins of Charlotte and held to the Federal grand jury at Trenton, N. J., in \$2,000 bond. She was remanded to jail when she could not give bond. Miss Dawson denied her guilt when arraigned. She is a native of Scotland.

The warrant was received yesterday from New Jersey. Miss Dawson could not be located at the time as she has been travelling from city to city in the strike zone. Today she appeared at strike headquarters in Gastonia and participated in a mass meeting at which several strike leaders spoke. The U. S. Marshal heard of her presence and Deputy Marshal Cain was sent to arrest her.

GASTONIA, April 18.—(AP)—Strike headquarters of the National Textile Workers union, from which organizers have been directing strike at the Lory mill, was demolished early today by a band of masked men. A relief store, established by the union next door to the headquarters building, also was destroyed. So far as could be learned this morning nobody was injured although it was stated that there were several fist fights and a number of shots were fired. County and national guard officers, guarding the mill property and keeping order in the mill village, today said they had no clues as to the perpetrators. Union leaders including Fred Erwin Beal, organizer for the national textile workers union who called the strike and who has been directing it, and George Pershing staff employe of "the daily worker" New York communist organ could not be located. Persons who saw the crowd of men who made kindling wood of the two buildings said that they apparently numbered several dozen, all wore white masks.

The strike at the Lory mill owned and operated by the Manville-Jencks company of Pawtucket, R. I. was called three weeks ago yesterday. On the first day disorders that threatened to turn into serious riots caused five companies of national guardsmen to be ordered to the scene. Later two companies were withdrawn and deputy sheriffs substituted.

Since the start of the Lory difficulties the national textile workers union has organized locals and called strikes at Pineville, Bessemer City and Lexington, N. C. The Pineville and Lexington mills have been closed to prevent trouble.

MIXED BOOZE AND HIS FISH

So New Bern Man Spends Night in Jail in Wayne Sobering Up

J. R. Smith, white man of New Bern, who was arrested on highway 10 a short distance from the city by Deputy John Korngay, and lodged in county jail on charges of transporting whiskey and being intoxicated, was released under \$200 bond later in the evening, it was learned yesterday.

Smith was moving a van named Hamilton from New Bern to Durham, where Hamilton told officers he is going to open a fish market. The small truck, with several boxes of fish in the back, belonged to Hamilton, but was being driven by Smith. The two men passed through the city. Deputy Korngay saw them on George street, and noticed that the driver appeared to be under the influence of whiskey. The officer gave chase and caught up with the other vehicle near the overhead bridge on the Raleigh road. About a quart of whiskey was found under the seat in a half-gallon fruit jar.

Smith was placed under arrest, and lodged in jail here until he sobered up, when he was released under bond.

WAYNE CO-OPS HOLD MEETING

Name Delegates to District Convention to Be Held Here April 23

A meeting of the Wayne County members of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Cooperative Association was held in the Community Building yesterday. At this meeting delegates to the district convention of the Fourth District which embraces the counties of Wayne, Lenoir, Jones, Carteret, Greene, Onslow, Craven and Pamlico were elected. These delegates will meet in Goldsboro Tuesday, April 23 and nominate two candidates for directors for this district. For nominees will be voted on by the entire membership of the district at an election to be held in Goldsboro, May 10th. The number of directors of the association has been increased from 10 to 15. Fourteen of these are elected by the members and one is appointed by the Governor as director at large. The director of the Fourth district at present is A. T. Griffin of Goldsboro. A message from U. BUGS MEET BUCS IN OPENER HERE AT 3:30

ANDREW LEWIS DIES SUDDENLY

Funeral Service Held From Graveside at Pate Cemetery Yesterday

Funeral services for Andrew Lewis, 54 year old white man of Greenleaf, who died suddenly at Talton's store later Wednesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, were held from the graveside at Pate's burying ground in Stoney Creek township yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock by Rev. Jerry Howell, Holiness church minister.

Mr. Lewis lived near Talton's store with one of his sons, Mason Howell. He was sitting by the fire in Talton's store Wednesday afternoon, and according to reports, had complained of being cold all day. A number of friends were also sitting around the fire talking, it was said. After awhile several of the men in the store, noticed that Lewis had apparently gone to sleep, but they kept on talking. Finally one of the men went over to investigate and found that he was dead.

Coroner T. R. Robinson was summoned, and after examining the body, pronounced that death was probably due to heart trouble. The remains were removed to a local undertaking establishment, where they were prepared for burial.

The deceased is survived by two sons, Zeb Howell, of Auburn, New York, and Mason, of Greenleaf; one daughter, Mrs. Eulah Mitchell, of Brogden township, one brother also survives, but his name could not be ascertained. Mr. Howell's wife had been dead for several years.

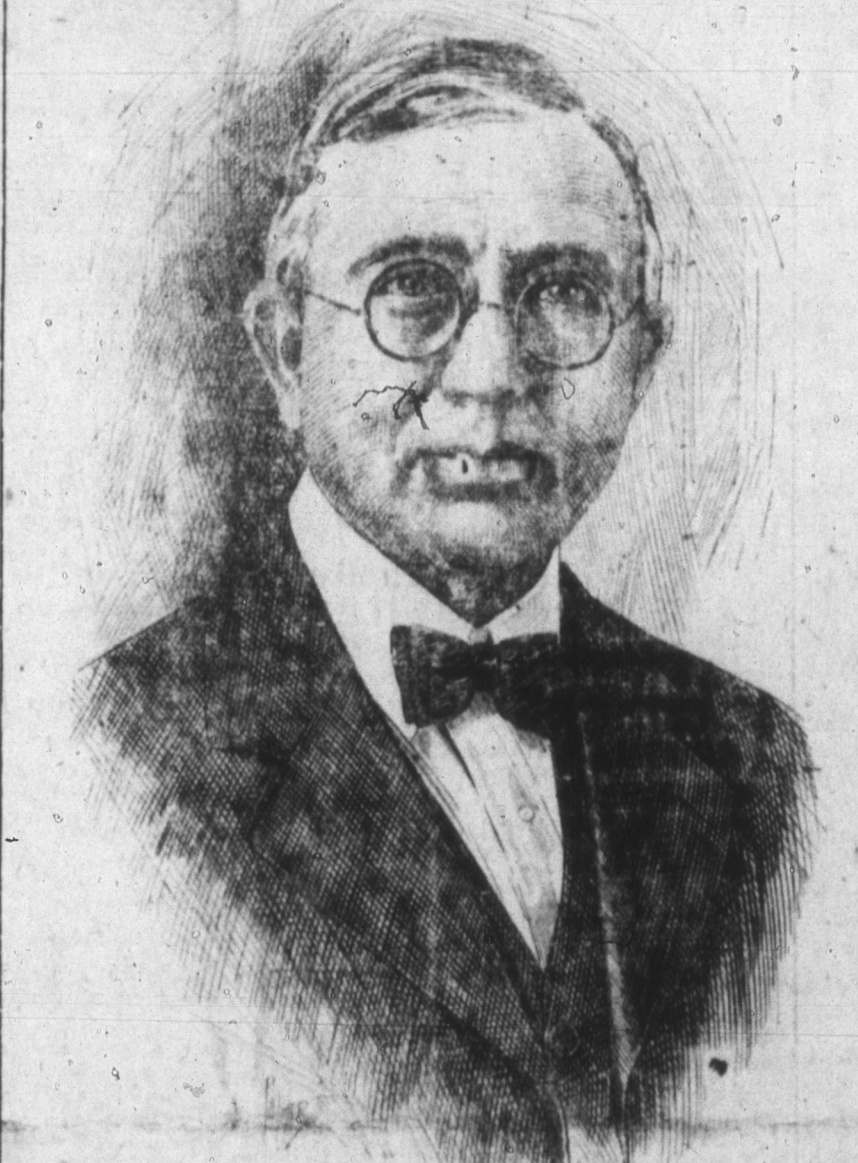

School Bus Turtles, Three Slightly Hurt

Robert Sasser, 14 year old son of L. Sasser, and two other school children were slightly injured yesterday morning when a brogden school bus overturned near the residence of Bert Martin. The Sasser boy sustained a slight cut in the top of the head which required two stitches to sew up and two other children received minor injuries that were attended by family physicians. The bus was "about half full" of children at the time it overturned. The news was told that the bus was just getting under way after a stop and skidded in a sand bed at a bend in the road, turning over into the field. The name of the driver could not be learned.

STEEL CASE IS TO END TODAY

Charge of Judge Grady Remains to Allow Action to Go To Jury

The charge of jury Henry A. Grady remained to be made in the case of Concrete Steel company against W. P. Rose when Superior court was adjourned for the day here yesterday. The day was taken up with the presentation of testimony by witnesses for the defendant, and by the arguments of the attorneys for both sides. The case, which has already occupied two days of this week, will probably be given to the jury a short time after court re-convenes this morning. Judgments were signed by Judge Grady yesterday in the following cases: Lionel Well vs. J. M. Morton. Judgment was awarded to the plaintiff in the amount of \$927.20 and the costs of the action. The automobile accident out of which the suit arose, occurred in May, 1927 near Princeton. In the car with Mr. Well at the time were his son, Lionel Jr., and Dorch Langston. The car, a Cadillac, was almost completely demolished. In the case of C. A. Smith against B. F. Underhill, the action was dismissed and the defendant ordered to pay the costs. The case of James Williams against Dorch Parker was settled and the action ordered dismissed.

TO OCCUPY NEW S. S. BUILDING

If Seats Arrive Methodist Will Use New Plant on Sunday Morning

If seats which have been shipped from Mt. Airy arrive in time, the new Sunday school building of the St. Paul Methodist church will be occupied for the first time on Sunday morning. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Glennie Howell, and one sister, Miss Olivia Howell, of Stoney Creek township.

RAY HINNANT IN A WRECK

Car Somersaults Several Times But He Escaped Without Serious Hurts

Though his automobile turned over several times and was demolished when it landed in a field, Ray Hinnant, of Goldsboro and Pikeville, escaped other than minor injury in an accident near the residence of Deems H. Pate, 3.5 miles north of the city on highway number 40, yesterday afternoon.

Hinnant was said to have lost control of the machine as it rounded a curve. It skidded off the pavement on the left hand side of the road going toward Pikeville, back across the highway and after somersaulting three times, came to a stop in a field, witnesses said. Hinnant probably owes his life to the fact that he was thrown clear of the machine as it hurtled.

He sustained a slight cut about the mouth and a gash on one hand.

HAYS STARTS DIVORCE SUIT

Czar of Movies Wants Freedom From Wife Whom He Is Separated

SULLIVAN, Ind., April 18.—(AP)—Will H. Hays, popularly known as "Czar of the movies," filed a petition in circuit court today for divorce from Helen Thomas Hays of this city and for custody of their 14-year-old son. The petition states that Mr. and Mrs. Hays were married in 1902 but separated because of the incompatibility of their temperaments and have not lived together for years.

PREXY GRIFFIN TO TOSS FIRST BALL OF GAME

Dope Is That Either Minogue, Raker or Bowman Will Face Rocky Mount

The Goldsboro Manufacturers will open the 1929 Eastern Carolina league baseball season in Goldsboro at Griffin Park this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock when they play the Rocky Mount Buccaneers in the first game of a two-game opening series on the local leg. No clanging of bells or blowing of whistles will announce the debut of last season's champion winners into the 1929 flag race. In fact, there will be no pretentious ceremony before the umpire causes the hearts of hundreds of local fans to flutter by calling "Play Ball."

At 3:30 o'clock this afternoon, President A. T. Griffin of the Manufacturers, will introduce to the fans each one of the members of the local club. This will be done in order to enable baseball enthusiasts to become familiar with the names and faces of the members of the "home town club." A few minutes later President Griffin will toss a brand new ball out to the umpire, officially opening the season.

At the same time the Bugs and the Hues are crossing bats in the opener here, similar contests will be underway between Fayetteville and Wilmington at Wilmington, and Kingston and Greenville at Greenville. Local fans, however, will not have time for thoughts of the two other opening games of the league season, in the opinion of local club officials. From the time the first ball is tossed over until the last man is called out in 15 1/2 min. a real diamond bat will be in process here, it is believed.

The Rocky Mount club, with Maury Georgia and Brooklyn, New York, to draw on for its material, is reported to have an excellent team in the slapping process. Bickham, first sacker for the local last season, will probably start at the initial sack in the opening game today. He has shown himself to be slightly off form from his performance of last year, but a number of fans are of the opinion that he will start today.

Either little Johnny Culler or Trapp will open up at short. Skipper Teague is expected to take up his regular position at second base. "Cannon Ball" Smith will probably start in left field, while Patton will almost certainly be out in the right garden, unless his bad leg keeps him out of the game altogether. The general opinion is to the effect that Pat Barr will start in center field.

NEW BATTLES HELD IMMINENT

Mexican Woman Dies of Fright When Plane Drops Bomb on City

NOGALES, Sonora, Mexico, April 18.—(AP)—Concentration of opposing armies in preparation for battle and the bombing of this city with one casualty due to fright were the outstanding developments in the northern sector of Mexico's civil war today. Reports from San Blas, Sinaloa, said that General Plutarco Elias Calles commander in chief of Federal armies was concentrating his forces at that point while rebel armies under General J. Gonzalo Escobar were converging on Navajarro for a stand against a probable attack by Calles. Each side had three airplanes in readiness for action. Seven bombs were dropped on Nogales this morning by a Federal plane. A Mexican woman Senora Isabel de Vallesteros died of fright, physicians said. She was fleeing toward the border when she dropped dead.

Girl Unconscious Since February 8th.

LYNCHBURG, Va., April 18.—(AP)—Marjorie Dowdy, 10, Lynchburg school girl has been unconscious 1,556 hours today. The little girl was injured in an automobile accident last February 8. Physicians today said her general condition showed improvement.
