One Plane Will Head For Rome and Other To Start For Paris Goal

Worked Last Night to Have Planes Ready for Start at 8 A. M. Today

WEATHER CONDITIONS ARE REPORTED AS FAVORABLE

Three Frenchmen and Two Americans Will Race Across Atlantic

OLD ORCHARD, Me., June 12 .- (A P)-Five fliers, three of them Frenchmen, the other two Americans who have for several weeks resaited weather favorable for flights to Europe, made ready tonight their planes the Yellow Bird and the Green Flash for a take off tomorrow morning-con tingent only on a report of continuous good weather late tonight.

"You may have a little thick weath er with local squalls and puffy winds for the first two hours," Dr. James H. Kimball of the New York weather bureau told Lewis A. Yancey, navigator of the Green Flash, "but conditions will improve and should be good the rest of the way."

Preparations were made to fuel the planes. The Green Flash, which will head for Rome will carry 530 gallous of gasoline while the Yellow Bird will take on 1,000 gallons of gasoline and benzol for Paris.

STOLEN AUTO IS RECOVERED

Wrecked on Highway Number 10 at Overhead Bridge by

Approximately four hours after the new Ford sport model coupe belongng to R. B. Willett, of Richmond, Va. was believed to have been stolen from n front of the home of E. H. Joyner on North George street, it was found by local officers abandoned on Highway 10 a few yards west of the overhead bridge just out of the city. The Ford had crashed into the wire fencing alongside the highway, tearing down several posts, and doing con iderable damage to the car.

Mr. Willett, who is a representative nown spring comof a national day evening to spend the night with Mr. Joyner, a friend of his. The Richmond man had parked his car in front of the house, and he and Joyner were sidng in the house talking about 11 Rev. William O. Cone, of the Epis- Sclock. About midnight Mr. Willett discovered that his car, containing his suit-case, and sample case had dis appeared. The car had been locked for the night and the owner had one of the keys in his pocket, but had left another key in one of the side door pockets. The theft was reported to the police, who immediately began investigating the case.

Yesterday morning about 10 o'clock Willett telephone to police headquarters for a report on his car, and was informed that it had been located by officers Rouse and Lancaster, of the ocal force. "Your car was found wrecked on the Raleigh highway about four o'clock this morning, and we had t hauled in to a local garage", the nxlous owner was told.

Willett came down in a short tmie and was taken to the Wayne garage by Traffic Officer Rouse, The Richmond man identified bis car and wheel, crushed right front fender and bent axle. His sample case was inact, however.
