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ARE DEMOCRATS GATTLER?

SOLEMNITY OF SILVER POLITICIANS TO TRADE NORTH CAROLINA DEMOCRATS TO BUTLER AND MOTT.

The Chamberlain Smith and Capt. E. B. Peabody go to Washington to "have the State" in a Conference with Butler and Mott.

The conference to "have the State" was held last night, according to advices daily wired to the News and Observer.

Mr. Peabody told me this morning that it was high time that something was being done, and Ed. Chambers Smith said if anybody could propose anything better than his new furor, let him do it, or forever hold his peace.

The interesting rumor now develops that it was at Butler's invitation that these gentlemen assembled here. Butler having cut loose so radically from the Democratic party, and Mott not being able to deliver the Republican, the old fusion with the gold bugs seemed to be taking the shape of an impossibility.

Mr. Peabody said the utmost harmony prevailed at the meeting, but was unwilling to tell the details of the plan worked out. From another trustworthy source, however, I am informed that, by the agreement involved in it, it is not entirely reached in the conference, the Democrats are to have the Governor, the Secretary of State and Attorney General; the Populists keep the War, and getting the Legislature to be divided into the Democrats and Populists in proportion to their respective forces.

I asked my informant how about the Auditor. He answered that he had conceded the Auditor to the Populists, but afterward half way corrected himself as to this. Just here Major Guthrie turns up, and I am informed he is kicking quite high against this new-fangled deal for Governor. Cooke; Attorney General, Ed. Chambers Smith; Treasurer, W. E. Worth; Supreme Court Justice, Capt. E. B. Peabody; next Senator, J. M. Mott. Some such unflattering view as this my informant thought had taken shape in Raleigh before these gentlemen arrived here. He said, moreover, that Judge Mac Rae, Mr. Spier Whitaker, and Major Guthrie were to be side-tracked for Governor and this was the reason why he thought there would be the devil to pay.

On the other hand, another strong Democrat, who is entirely disinterested, says the movement will meet with a hearty response from a large portion of the people. To say the least, the whole business has created somewhat of a sensation among the little North Carolina colony here, as well as among those visiting the city.
