NEW LAW ON REGISTRATION.

LAW Emerted by the Legislature of the

In order that there might be no confusion as to the dates for registration, challenging, etc., the chairmen of the Republican, Populist and Demouratic parties held a mosting and entered into an agreement about the matters in question. The agreement is very important and about he read by every voter. It is agreed by the undersigned that the fellowing is the proper construction of the election law of 1895. Acts '95, chapter 199, and we request the members of our respective parties to fellow the same:

Int. In construing sections 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14 of mid election law:

That all persons are entitled to register on Saturday, September 19th; on Saturday, October 19th; on Saturday, October 19th; on Saturday, Detober 17th, and on these days only, between the hours of 9 o'clock a. m. and 6 o'clock p. m., except as herewith provided—
On Saturday, October 24th, no set

On Saturday, October 94th, no set

On Saturday, October 34th, no set shall be done in regard to registration, except the right to challenge, between the hours of 9 o'clock a. m., and 4 o'clock p. m., any elector whose name may appear on the books.

On Saturday, October 31st, no act shall be done in regard to registration, except to hear and determine all challenges made on October 34th. The hearing shall be had between the hours of 9 o'clock a. m. and 4 o'clock p. m. in all precincts except those in incorporated towns and cities, when the hearing shall be had until 9 o'clock p. m.

hearing shall be had until 9 e'clock p. m.

That any person who comes of age between October 17th and election day, or who is entitled to registration by reason of his residence in State or county, being sufficient time required by law, which time ripsued after Saturday. October 17th, shall be entitled to register on election day and wote, and such persons who offer to register and vote on election day may be challenged and said challenge be heard on election day.


