THEY WERE SHORT AND TO THE POINT.
First Street News Game Saturday
Morning - The President Thanks the
Commander and Makes His Parting
Address.

Secretary Long received Commodore
Dewey's report at 9:30 o'clock Satur-
day morning, and at once delivered it
to President McKinley. It came to
Hong Kong on the dispatch boat Mc-
Culloch and was cabled from there.
The following was given out by the
department:

MANILA, May 1. - Squadron arrived
at Manila at daylight this morning.
Immediately engaged the enemy and
destroyed the following Spanish ves-
sels: Reina, Christiana, Castilla, Don
Antonio de Ulloa, Isla de Duza, Isla
de Cuba, General Laso, Marques de
Duero, Correo, Reina, Isla de Mind-
anao, a transport and water battery
at Cavite. The squadron is unscathed
and only a few men are slightly
wounded. Only messages of telegraph-
ing to America's consul at Hong
Kong. I shall communicate with him.

Before this brief summary of the
cablegram as far as received, had been
given out by a prominent officer, in
which it was stated that Dewey out-
rigger the cable himself, but was unable
to take possession of the town of Manila
for lack of men; also that he had the
bay and everything else completely at
his mercy.

It was generally noticed that the
cablegram was officially promulgated,
did not entirely agree with this brief
summary and the presumption was
that in the short time accorded for the
consideration the officials had con-
cluded that it was public policy to ex-
purgate the dispatch.

A second dispatch was received be-
fore noon. It was as follows:
"CAVITE, May 4. - I have taken
possession of the naval station at Ca-
vite, Philippine Islands, and destroyed
its fortifications. Have destroyed in-
stallations at bay entrance, paroling
the garrison. I control the bay com-
pletely and can take the city at any
time. Squadron in excellent health
and spirits. The Spanish fleet not fully
known, but very heavy, 160 killed, in-
cluding the captain of the Reina Chris-
tiana. I am assisting in protecting the
Spanish sick and wounded. Two hun-
dred and fifty sick and wounded in the
hospital within our lines. Much excite-
ment at Manila. Will protect foreign
residents. Dewey."

Secretary Long, by direction of the
president, sent the following reply to
Dewey:
"WASHINGTON, May 7th, '98.
Dewey, Manila: The president, in
the name of the American people,
thanks you and your officers and men
for your splendid achievement and
overwhelming victory. In recognition
has appointed you acting admiral,
and I recommend a vote of thanks
to you by congress. Long."

On May 6th Mr. Linsberger,
surrounded by his loyal family and
many intimate friends, passed out
of this world to return no more.
His death was not unexpected as he
had been confined to his room and bed
for several months. During this time
his friends anxiously watched by his
bed to catch at every hopeful indica-
tion of recovery, but only to see him
gradually grow weaker until the
reluctant hand of paralysis.
The county loses one of
her best citizens, a man who had
been a Lutheran church one of her most
devoted and faithful members, his home
a husband and a father who was its
inspiration and joy. He leaves a wid-
ow, a sister, Mr. Jonas Hoffman of
Dallas, and eight surviving children to
mourn their irreparable loss, together
with a host of friends and relatives.
He had arrived on his 74th year, and
during all these years he added
after friends to the list of his admirers
and died triumphantly in the Chris-
tian faith and without an enemy.

His funeral was conducted by the
writer and his body laid to rest in the
old family burial place on the 7th, and
the community who had there assem-
bled to pay the last tribute of respect
to their dear loved one slowly and
sadly wended their way homeward.
This passed away one of our best
whom we deeply and sorrowfully miss
but whose life we shall
love to remember and to imitate.
