Almost a Certainty That It Will Soon Change Hands. Yorkville Register. The probability that the Carolina & Northwestern Railroad will change hands at an early day now seems to amount almost to a certainty.

As we understand the situation—as explained by Mr. Thomas H. White—Mr. White and associates tried to sell the bonds of the road in such a way as to continue the control of the present management.

As the result of further efforts to sell the White interest finally fell into co-operation with the Barber and Marion interest, and the former companies are now working together to control the entire property to third parties.

What will become of the road in the event of a sale, is purely a matter of speculation. Mr. White does not undertake to say; but feels reasonably certain that it will be converted into a standard gauge and extended across the mountains.
