A WOOD RIGH.

War Has Caused Only a Suspension of Beason in Engiand and America. New York Evening Port.

It is of good augury for the new year that there has been something like a return to reason in both Eogland and the United States. Last year began in almost universal political strife and unreason. Nearly all the strife and unresson. Meany all the great political problems were in a measure withdrawn from discussion and faced in a spirit of blind national-ism. In England the government would admit no error in the incurring would agant to error in the incurring and prosecution of the Boer war; it is freely called criticism, treason, and gunerally professed a complete con-tempt for the moral condemnation of other rations. In this country the railing party was as yet bardly willing to adait that it could do wrong, and bad practically refused to take counset upon the grave problem of expansion which confronted it, leaving much to chance and more to interested party leaders. That just dealing with Caba, efficient management of the Philippines, the selection of an interoceanic canal, were matters for deliberation and the weighing of evidence, would hardly have two conceded a warhardly have teen conceded a year ago. Of course the ground of this rule of unreason in both England and America was the fact of war, either actually at hand or of recent memory. But it is very fortunate that war seasoning. Soorer or later the war itself and its results must be submitted to unemotional investigation. When people negate to mak, Was it right? Does it pay to incur the distrust of the Does it pay to incur the distrust of the world? Is there anything to be done by which the war may be shortened, and its worse effects avoided?—then there is hope that out of war may be tardily wrought the peaceable fruits of righteomess. Our government and the English are reaching such a temper that they are nearly ready to admit that a large part of administration is remedying our own mistakes of our predecessors. If the governing parties both here and there, unfortunately lately the attending and the criticism of a strong opposition, it is all the more a strong opposition, it is all the more creditable that both conservatives and Reputitoans evince a disposition to substitute counted and debate for the
