DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

**Not in Greensboro Yesterday—
Oath of Fidelity, Forty
Sung, in Place of Hour of
Convention Hall—Consider
Speeches in His
Speeches**

Greensboro, N. C., June 23.—The great warehouse used as a convention hall is packed to its utmost capacity with about 4,000 sweltering Democrats making a vast unwieldy and tumultuous assembly. At this hour, 5 o'clock, Gov. Aycock is concluding a magnificent oration on the Democratic State administration of the past three years. He began to speak at a quarter past four and his stirring address was punctuated by uncontrollable outbursts of applause.

Almost no real work has been done. At noon Chairman Simmons called the Convention to order. After a gallant effort to make himself heard he asked leave to "print his remarks" and abandoned his address.

A motion to adopt the platform and then name the candidates was amended so as to name the candidates first and was carried overwhelmingly. The work thus far has been preparatory. The battle of oratory and ballots in the real work of nominations will begin probably tonight.

Gaston's delegation is forty strong. All are as mad as wet hens over having been assigned to seats in the rear. Any management that practices a "go way back and sit down" policy on Gaston county Democrats makes a grave blunder.

Of our delegation Mr. O. F. Mason was placed on the committee on platform and resolutions and Mr. A. G. Mangum on the order of business. Mr. R. E. Ray was re-elected a member of the State Convention. The spokesman of the delegation is Mr. J. O. White. Who will be governor? That question must be answered later.

At 6:30 Steadman has been identified by Victor S. Bryant; Turner by W. A. Self; Davidson by Luke Craig. Eloquent speeches received with enthusiasm. Election nominating Glass at this moment. Was received by cheers and shouting in all parts of the hall that lasted full two minutes.

At 7:30 the convention has adjourned to meet at 9 o'clock tonight. Mr. E. T. Casler is seconding Glass's nomination. Glass is a man whose name is a synonym for nerve and his opponents objecting, and when he referred to "K&L Glove Democrats" there was a great tumult of objections and shouts of "make them name them!" After several attempts to proceed Mr. Casler concluded without being able to make himself heard longer. Ruffling begins too late for reports tonight.

WEBB BY ACCLAMATION.

HE IS CHOSEN UNANIMOUSLY.

Democratic Congressional Convention chooses Hon. E. Yates Webb for Congress—His Past Record Heartily Endorsed—Clyde E. Hoey and H. N. Pharr Delegates to National Convention—Chas. Brenizer Presidential Elector—The Convention in Detail.

Promptly at ten o'clock Wednesday morning the Democratic convention of the Ninth Congressional District of North Carolina met in the Opera House in Gastonia. The various delegations were in their assigned positions when the convention was called to order by Mr. R. S. Plouk of Kings Mountain, who is chairman of the Congressional Executive Committee.

An address of welcome on behalf of the democracy of Gaston and Gastonia was delivered by Mr. W. F. Marshall, to which a happy response was made by C. H. Duls, Esq., of Charlotte. Chairman Plouk then named Mr. W. F. Marshall as temporary chairman and invited the representatives of the Democratic press present to act as secretaries. Messrs. J. C. Abernethy of the Charlotte Observer, A. R. Eley, of the Charlotte News, O. M. Mull of the Shelby Star, Hugh Long, of the Gastonia News, and James W. Atkins, of THE GASTONIA GAZETTE, came forward as secretaries of the convention.

The temporary organization was, by motion of Capt. J. F. Gardner of Shelby, made permanent and the convention plunged immediately into the transaction of the business which called it together.

At his seat in the Cleveland delegation Mr. Clyde E. Hoey arose and placed in nomination the incumbent, Hon. E. Yates Webb, for Representative from the Ninth Congressional District, in an eloquent and well-received speech. The nomination of Mr. Webb was seconded in brief speeches by Messrs. I. H. Bailey, of Mitchell, Guy V. Roberts, of Madison, A. G. Mangum, of Gaston. At this point Mr. E. S. Williams, of the Mecklenburg delegation, arose and moved that Mr. Webb be nominated by acclamation which motion was seconded by Mr. R. L. Swan amid the increasing applause. This applause broke forth into cheers when the motion was put and carried unanimously by a rising vote.

On motion of Hon. O. F. Mason, the usual committee on platform and resolutions was dispensed with. Going then into the election of delegates to the National Convention at St. Louis, July 6th, the convention chose the following by acclamation: Delegates: Clyde E. Hoey and H. N. Pharr. Alternates: C. B. Armstrong and Jno. H. Pearson. Mr. Hoey's name was presented by Hon. O. F. Mason in a most complimentary and effective manner. Mr. E. S. Williams nominated Mr. Pharr, Sheriff Armstrong was nominated by Mr. Mangum and Hon. J. H. Pearson by Mr. E. S. Williams.

For Presidential Elector there was but one nomination: Chas. Brenizer, Esq., of Charlotte, who was presented in a neat speech by Mr. C. H. Duls. His nomination was made by acclamation. By direction of the Convention, on a motion of Mr. E. L. Swan put by Hon. O. F. Mason, the chair appointed a committee to notify Mr. Webb of his nomination and escort him to the platform. E. L. Swan, S. A. Hoey, E. S. Williams were named for this committee.

While the committee was out, a set of ringing resolutions adopted by the untainted and untainted Democracy of Mitchell county was handed to the secretary to be read as information to the convention. These were well read in a clear mellow voice by Mr. Hugh Long, of the Gastonia News.

These resolutions in eloquent terms endorsed the administration of Governor Aycock, expressed great pride in the speech of Hon. Claude Kitchin in the House of Representatives Friday, April 22, and his scathing 10 minutes reply to Gen. Grover and W. F. Hepburn, and also similar praise in the alertness and vigor with which Hon. E. Y. Webb nailed the lie about Mr. Cleveland's entertaining the negro at his table; and in conclusion Mr. Webb's entire course in Congress was endorsed.

Amid the cheers of the convention, Hon. E. Y. Webb was escorted by the committee to the platform. As he faced his admiring fellow-citizens, erect, clear-featured, and handsome, the applause was renewed. In words of sincere appreciation, he thanked the convention for the honor just conferred. Addressing himself to political issues, he arraigned the Republican party for insincerity, extravagance and corruption.

Passing then to the achievements of the Democratic party he told of what had been done for the State in the way of establishing public institutions, providing for the education of the children of the State, and caring for the Confederate veterans in their declining years. He then touched on national politics with special reference to the present Republican administration. The post office scandals and the inconsistencies of Roosevelt came in for a share of the speaker's attention.

MAP OF MECKLENBURG COUNTY

Congressman Webb Secures Appropriation from Government for Survey of Mecklenburg County.

Charlotte Observer, 22nd. Congressman E. Y. Webb, of this district, was over from his home at Shelby for the meeting of the State Bar Association Monday night and yesterday morning. While there he told an Observer reporter that the work of surveying Mecklenburg county for a topographical map would be started within a few weeks. This survey will be made at the expense of the national and State governments, and will cost each \$5,000—a total of \$10,000.

A topographical map is the perfection of map-making. The map of Mecklenburg will show the residence of every person in the county, every creek, branch and spring, and every road will have all distances exact. The map will be almost invaluable, not only to the 60,000 people living in this county, but will be of a great deal of value in advertising the resources of the county and securing new citizens.

Mr. Webb stated that work on the survey would begin by September 1st and the map will probably be completed before Christmas. A geological survey will be made in connection with the survey for the map, and it is possible that this may be worth many thousand dollars.
