BIG MILL DEAL.

Mesers. 6. A. Gray and T. L. Craig Sell Their Stock in the Aven to the Leves and Mr. Daniel E. Rhyne-The Mill Has Strong Financial Backing -Mr. Rhyne a Valuable Acquisition to Gastonia Mill Cir-

A transaction of interest in local financial circles took place Saturday afternoon at a meeting of the stockholders of the Avon Cotton Mill held in the company's up-town office, at which Messrs. Geo. A. Gray and Thos. Cotton Mill held in the company's up-town office, at which Messrs. Geo. A. Gray and Thos. L. Craig resigned as directors of the mill.

Capt. R. C. G. Love of Gastonia was elected President and mia was elected President and Mr. Daniel E. Rhyne of Lincolnton was elected Vice President of the mill. These gentlemen were also elected directors to succeed Messrs. Gray. and Craig. Mr. John F. Love remains in his former position of Secretary and Treasurer. No Secretary and Treasurer. No further changes will be made in the management of the mill for the present.

These changes in the directorate and management of the mill were consequent to the dis-position by Mr. Gray and Mr. Craig of their entire holdings of stock in the Avon, amounting to \$75,000. The stock was purchased by Capt. R. C. G. Love and Mr. John F. Love of Gastonia, Messrs. Edgar Love and Robert A. Love of Lincolnton, and Mr. Daniel B. Rhyne of

Lincolnton Negotiations are now pending as a result of which it is probable that the entire stock of the mill will pass into the hands of the gentlemen named above.

Mr. Daniel B. Rhyne, the new president, is one of the wealthiest and most successful cotton mill men in this section of North Carolina. In addition to his new position he is president of the Daniel Manufacturing Company of Lincolnton; president of the Lincolnton mills; proprietor of the Laboratory mills and vice president of the Chronicle mills at Belmont. Gastonia is to be congratulated on the addition to the circle of her mill magnates of a man of such wide experience in the mill business and one with such atrong financial backing. His identification with Gastonia mill interests can but result in great benefit to the town. Mr. Rhyne is a genial bachelor and a man of pleasing personality.
