REV. J. E. BRAMLETT DEAD.

Father of Mrs. P. T. fleath Blod

Sunday in Atlanta-Burled in Gastonia To-day. Rev. James R. Bramlett'died

Rev. James R. Bramlett'died in Atlanta about 7 o'clock Sunday evening. The sal event occurred at the home of his daughter, Mrs. P. T. Heath, at 32 East Cain street. Just before the family left Gastoria Mr. Bramlett suffered a stroke of paralysis from which he never recovered. At the home of his daughter, he had the tender nursing which only a devoted wife and children can give.

During the day he appeared to be better. As night came on, he expressed a desire to be quiet that he might sleep. About 20 minutes afterwards, his daughter, Miss Pauline, entered his room and saw that the pale messenger had called him. His hands were folded across his breast, and every sign indicated that he had passed away as if in sleep.

At noon to-day, he was buried in the cemetery at Gastonia. A short service was held at the grave by Rev. E. L. Bain. Mr. and Mrs. Heath, Messrs. John and Will Bramlett, and Miss Pauline Bramlett formed the funeral party, and were guests while here at the home of Mr.

W. D. Barringer. Mr. Bramlett was 72 years of age. During the war he was a forage master in the Confedertorage master in the Confederate army. He came back after the war without surrendering or being captured. Like his great chief, Jefferson Davis, he refused to take the oath of allegiance to the new order of things. As a minister of the gospel he was faithful and carnest, strong in character and purposes a true in character and purpose, a true friend, a kind neighbor, a de-voted husband and father. During the days of his residence in Gastonia he formed many friends who sincerely mourn with those who sorrow because of his death.
