BARNES GETS BIG BODST.

Had Mrs. Morris Bragged Out-Is This His Reward? Washington Cor. News and Observe

The appointment by the President of B. F. Barnes to be postmaster of the city of Washington is causing no inconsiderable stir. Barnes is the assistant secretary to the President, and is responsible for the knockdown-and-drag-out treatment of Mrs. Minor Morris at the White House office some weeks ago.

The appointment is characterized by many as an insult to the community, which not only expressed its sense of outrage at the treatment of Mrs. Morris, but censured the Presideut for his failure to reprove Mr. Barnes and the officers who conducted the "drag-out."
The President refused to make an investigation of the affair, declaring boldly in effect that Mr. Barnes and the policeman had told him all about it, and that was all that was necessary; there was nothing to investigate He was severely censured for

Now Mr. Barnes receives his reward, being appointed to an office paying \$6,000, double his present salary, and placing him in a position second to none in point of elevation and responsi-bility to any of the district

offices. In addition to this objection Mr. Barnes is a Cauadian, and it is looked upon as an affront to the district that he and not some resident of the district is appointed.

DID PERKINS STEAL?

Gave Money of Democratic Policy-Helders to Aid Republicans-Not Larceny; Immorel, says Jerome.

Charlotte Observer New York, March 30.—Arguments on the habeas corpus proceedings in the case of George W. Perkins, former vicepresident of the New York Life Insurance Company, who charged in a warrant issued by Magistrate Moss with the larceny of \$48,702 belonging to the policy-holders of the New York Life Insuranc Company, which he advanced to Cornelius N. Bliss, treasurer of the Republican national committee, were made to day before Justice Greenbaum in the State Supreme Court. Decision was reserved. Briefs will be filed Monday by contending coursel and then Justice Greenbaum will take the matter of the legality of Mr. Perkin's arrest under advisement.
