ROBT. O. FAYSSOUX DEAD.

Promising Young Man Passes Away After Brief Illness From Appendicitis—Funeral a 4 Burial This Morning.

Strong, active and apparently in the best of health, Robert O. Fayssoux, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Fayssoux, was stricken last Thursday night with a violent attack of appendicitis, from the effects of which death ensued yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock. His case was desperate from the first and the young man suffered intense pain. He had previously had slight attacks of what he presumed to be colic but they soon passed off. When he became ill an examination by physicians revealed the fact that he was suffering from an advanced case of appendicitis. At that time his condition would not admit of an operation and it was deferred. On Wednesday Dr. Pressley, of Charlotte, was called in consultation and a slight operation was performed. The appendix was not removed, however.

Had he lived till the 19th of August he would have been 18 years of age. For the past six months he had been in the employ of the Gastonia Hardware Company, where he was held in high esteem by all his associates. He was quiet, industrious, courteous and numbered his friends by the circle of his acquaintance. His friends were indeed many, as was evidenced by the remarks of concern heard on every hand during his illness.

Funeral services were held at the late home of the deceased this morning, the services being conducted by Rev. Dr. J. C. Galloway and Rev. W. H. Hardin. Interment followed in Oakwood Cemetery. There were many friends present to testify to the sorrow that is felt in the community over his death. The sorrowing parents, brothers and sisters have the sympathy of many in their sorrow.

BOND ELECTION ORDERED.

City Council Calls Election on \$75,000 Bond Issue for Municipal Improvements to be Held July Second—New Registration.

Following the citizens mass meeting of Tuesday night the board of aldermen met in called session Wednesday night and adopted resolutions calling for an election as to the issuance of \$75,000 in bonds, as specified below, under act of the last General Assembly. In addition to this a small amount of routine business was transacted. Bills to the amount of \$114.40 were audited and ordered paid and the treasurer was empowered to borrow \$2,500.

The resolution calling for an election follows: "Whereas, it has been determined by the mayor and the board of aldermen of the town of Gastonia that the sum of \$75,000 is requisite and necessary in order to carry out the purposes set forth in an act of the General Assembly of North Carolina entitled, 'An act to authorize the board of aldermen of the town of Gastonia to issue bonds in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, etc.' chapter \_\_\_\_\_, of the statutes of 1907, to be expended as follows:

- "For street improvements, \$30,000. "For graded schools, \$15,000. "For water-works and sewerage, \$23,000. "For electric lights, \$2,000. "For refunding the present floating debt, \$5,000.
