—The Gastonia Cotton Oil Company is making some extensive improvements at its factory, preparatory for the next season. A 50 horse-power General Electric motor has been ordered and will soon be installed. This is to drive the gin and will be operated by power from the Southern Power Company. An electric power tramper is also to be installed to replace the steam power tramper now in use for packing the cotton in the first box. In the oil manufacturing department the same power will be used as at present, which is electric power generated by their own motor. New arrangements will be made, however, for lighting the oil manufacturing department. In addition to these improvements the entire plant is being overhauled and put in tip-top shape for the next ginning season. The plant is now closed for the summer but will be ready to open as soon as new cotton appears on the market. Mr. William King, the manager, is looking after these renovations. The installation of the 50 horse-power motor will incressate the daily capacity in the ginnery six bales. The capacity of the oil plant will not be increased.

BOND ELECTION ORDERED.

City Council Calls Election on \$75,000 Bond Issaue for Municipal Improvements to be Held July Second-New Registra-

Following the citizens mass neeting of Tuesday night the poard of aldermen met in called session Wednesday night and adopted resolutions calling for an election 'as to the issuance of o'clock. The resolution calling for an election follows:

"Whereas, it has been determined by the mayor and the board of aldermen of the town of Gastonia that the sum of \$75,000 is requisite and necessary in order to carry out the purposes set forth in an act of the General Assembly of North Car-olina entitled, "An act to authorize the board of aldermen of the town of Gastonia to issue bonds in the sum Gastonia to issue bonds in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, etc," chapter—, of the—statutes of 1807, to be expended as follows:

"For street improvements, \$30,000.
"For graded schools, \$15,000.
"For water-works and sewerage, \$23,000.

"For electric lights, \$2,000.
"For refunding the present floating debt, \$5,000. "Therefore, the said mayor and the board of aldermen of the town of Gastonia do ordain and enact:

"1. That the sum of thirty thou-sand dollars be expended for street improvements; that the sum of fif-teen thousand dollars be expended for graded schools; that the sum of twenty-three thousand dollars be expended for water-works, and sewerage; that the sum of two thou-sand dollars be expended for elec-tric lights; that the sum of five thousand be expended for funding the floating debt

the floating debt. "2. That an election be called to ascertain the will of the qualified electors of the town of Gastonia and for authorizing the issuance of the interest-bearing bonds of the said, the town of Gastonia, for the said purpose of raising the said sum of seventy-five thousand dollars. "3. That the said election shall be held at the town hall in the town of Gastonia, North Carolina, on Tuesday the 2nd day of July, 1907.

"4. That a new registration of the qualified electors of the town of Gastonia, be and the same is hereby ordered, and W. T. Rankin is appointed registrar, and is required to open up books for a new registration according to the said act; that John F. Bradley and M. H. Shuford be and are hereby appointed the judges of the said election.

"5. It is further ordained and enacted that notice of the said Miss Faunie Wideman, of Due tion be published at the door of the West, has been elected lady principal of Linwood College.
