## NORTH CAROLINA SYNOD.

**Ninety-Fourth Annual Session Held at Hendersonville—Large Attendance—Reports on the Work of the Year.**

The Synod of North Carolina convened in its ninety-fourth annual session in the Presbyterian church at Hendersonville Tuesday night. More than one hundred and fifty delegates were present at the opening service. The opening sermon was preached by W. R. Coppedge, the retiring moderator. Rev. C. M. Richards, of Statesville, was elected moderator and Rev. C. E. Hodgkin and Rev. J. W. Lafferty were elected temporary clerks.

At the morning session on Wednesday the standing committees were announced and a communication read from Union Theological Seminary, in New York, asking that the sum of \$135,000 be raised by this Synod. Addresses were delivered by Rev. M. B. Porter, D. D., agent of the American Bible Society, and Rev. S. L. Morris, D. D., secretary of home missions. Rev. W. D. Morton was appointed to write a memoir of Rev. Alfred H. Moment, D. D., the only minister of the synod who has died during the past year. Several interesting addresses were delivered at the evening session, and a report made showing that the synod has during the past year contributed to the cause of foreign missions the sum of \$30,611.

The morning session of Thursday was taken up with the reports of various committees, after which the synod listened to a highly commended sermon by Rev. Milton R. Clark, of Greensboro. Rev. D. I. Craig was re-elected stated clerk and treasurer for a term of three years. The next meeting of the synod will be held at Newbern.

**To Open November 1st.** The Bessemer City Bank, which was organized and chartered several months ago with a capital of \$10,000, will open for business on November 1st. Mr. L. L. Jenkins, of Gastonia, is president and Mr. J. J. Ormand, of Bessemer City, will be cashier. This bank has elegant and modernly equipped quarters in the new Masonic building. Bessemer City is a good business town and its citizens are to be congratulated on the addition of a bank to the town's business interests. A meeting of the stockholders will be held in the bank's offices on October 31st.

**Capt. Ormand Injured.** Capt. Meek Ormand's many Gastonia friends and friends in the county will be pained to learn that he suffered severe injuries in Charlotte last night. The following in regard to the accident is from this morning's Observer: "Mr. B. M. Ormand, a freight conductor on the Southern Railway between Charlotte and Spartanburg, S. C., was painfully hurt by being thrown from his frightened horse against the front of a moving street car on Morehead street last night about 11 o'clock. Capt. Ormand was riding horseback when his steed became frightened and ran, throwing him. He sustained a number of gashes in his head, but beyond scalp wounds appears to be uninjured. He was immediately placed on a special street car and taken to the Presbyterian Hospital. He was operated on there soon and at midnight was resting comfortably. None of the wounds are believed to be serious."
