The Synod of North Carolina convened in its ninety-fourth annual session in the Preshyterian church at Hendersonvillle Tuesday night. More than one hundred and fifty delegates were present at the opening service. The opening sermon was preached by W. R. Coppedge, the retiring moderator. Rev. C. M. Richards, of Statesville, was elected moderator and Rev. C. E Hodgin and Rev. J. W. Lafferty were elected temporary clerks.

At the morning session on Wednesday the standing committees were announced and a communication read from Union Teological Seminary, in New York, asking that the sum of \$135,000 be raised by this Synod. Addresses were delivered by Rev. M. B. Porter, D. D., agent of the American Bible Society, and Rev. S. L. Morris, D. D., secretary of home missions. Rev. W. D. Morton was appointed to write a memoir of Rev. Alfred H. Moment, D. D. the only minister of the synod who has died during the past year. Several interesting addresses were delivered at the evening session, and a report made showing that the synod has during the past year contributed to the cause of foreign missions the sum of \$30,611.
