tion of Commissioners of Agri-
culture will meet in Columbia,
S. C., November 19th. All the
southern States from Maryland
to Texas will probably be repre-
sented.

The United States Depart-
ment of Agriculture is prepar-
ing to take up co-operative farm-
ing with twelve or fifteen hun-
dred farmers of western North
Carolina during the next few
months.

**ANOTHER YEAR'S
GREAT RECORD**

Hundreds of New Plants with
Millions of Capital Added in
the Territory Reached by the
Southern Railway and Mobile
& Ohio Railroad.

That territory adjacent to the
Southern Railway and Mobile &
Ohio Railroad is not only main-
taining its splendid industrial
growth but is making new re-
cords along manufacturing lines
is again vividly shown through
the figures compiled by the Land
and Industrial Department of
these lines which appear in its
recent annual report, covering
the fiscal year ending June 30th.
The statistics tell a most inter-
esting story and are remarkable
tributes to the enterprising forces
working continually for the de-
velopment of important resour-
ces and the growth and progress
of a section having many and
diversified interests.

The report shows that 989 new
industries, with a capital of \$54,-
726,000 were completed and put
into operation in the territory
tributary to the Southern and
Mobile & Ohio Railroads during
the twelve months ending June
30th, a gain of many millions of
capital over the previous year.
In addition 220 industries made
important additions to their
plants materially increasing their
facilities, at an investment of
\$11,331,300, and 90 industries,
with a capital of \$7,129,500, were
reported as under construction.
These figures show the invest-
ment during the year of the
great sum of \$73,286,800 in in-
dustries. In addition to this
there was expended for general
investments in cities and towns
such as buildings, street improve-
ments, street railways, water and
light plants \$58,430,885. This
shows a grand total of \$135,268,-
785 invested in industries an im-
provement along the line of the
Southern Railway and Mobile &
Ohio Railroad for the year end-
ing June 30th last, outside of the
money invested in lands and
farms and farm improvements.

Of the total investments in
new industries \$4,084,000 went
into the textile industry. The
cotton and oil mills called for
investments of \$1,117,000, iron
and iron products \$4,152,000,
lumber mills \$5,170,300, mis-
cellaneous woodworking plants
\$1,900,500, furniture factories
\$1,152,500, brick plants \$1,375,-
100 and fertilizer factories \$618,-
000.

The showing is certainly a
magnificent one and indicates
clearly the steady and rapid
growth of the Southeastern
States, and the work of further
development of the country
immediately tributary to these
lines into one of the greatest and
most prosperous industrial
regions of America and the
world.

The gain in farm values and
farm production in this region
has kept pace with the remark-
able industrial development.
New settlers from the North and
from Europe have gone into the
various communities along the
lines in increasing numbers and
large investments have been
made in both improved and un-
improved farm properties.
