Franklin delivered the address of welcome, which was responded to by Supt. T. R. Foust, of the Guilford county schools and vice-president of the Assembly. The teachers then heard an eloquent address from Governor Robert B. Glenn. At the close of the Governors speech Dr. C. W. Stiles, of the United States Public Health Service, spoke on "How to Decrease the Death-Rate among School Children." During the day Wednesday a number of sectional conferences were held and at night Prof. P. P. Claxton, of the University of Tennessee delivered an address on "The School and the State."

BLOCKADE STILL CAPTURED.
