

A completely equipped machine shop, with two expert machinists in charge, is prepared to do il the mill's repairing even to reanding the motors for the electriis obtained from three wells on the premises. When running full time the output of this mill is 15,000

pounds of yarns and 10,000 pounds of cloth per week.
