Debate on the 18th.

Friday, February 18th, is the date which has been selected for the joint debate between the Gastonia and Shelby high schools, mention of which was made in The Gazette some time ago. The debate will be held this time at Shelby. The question for discussion is, "Resolved, That the United States should subsidize her ship companies until they are able to compete with lines of other countries." At a preliminary debate held last week Messrs. Frances Whitesides, Edgar McLean, Otis Lineberger and Judson Shannon were chosen as debaters for another contest to be held soon when a final selection of two representatives for Gastonia will be made. This will be the first time that pupils of the Gastonia city schools have ever entered into a forensic combat with another school and the event is awaited with interest. It is probable that an annual series of interscholastic debates may result from this experiment.
