Work to be Rushed on Interurban Car Lines.

Charlotte News.

If the present plans of the Piedmont Traction Company are carried out, interurban cars will be in operation in less than six months between Charlotte, Gastonia, Anderson, Salisbury and other cities to the north and south carrying freight and passengers, propelled by electric power generated by the Southern Power Company, and a new era will have been begun in the history of the industrial and commercial progress of the Piedmont section.

Mr. W. S. Lee, Jr., the president of the company, has been in New York for about ten days conferring with the other officers and members of the company. In the conference which was held all the details of the construction and operation of the interurban system were worked out. The work of Mr. Lee while away was the purchase of the electrical equipment and contracts have been let for the entire equipment of the system.

A corps of engineers will start to work the first of the week laying out the route from Mount Holly to Charlotte. As soon as the right of way is secured and the route definitely determined, the active work of construction will be begun all along the line. Construction forces will be put at work on all parts of the system and the laying of tracks and erection of transmission lines will be rushed to immediate completion.
