PREVENTION OF TUBERCULOSIS.

Following Are the Resolutions Adopted by the North Carolina Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis in Session at Greensboro March 15-16:

Whereas tuberculosis is known to be communicable, curable, and preventable; and

Whereas, at present, the loss to society in deaths and in money justifies a concerted effort on the part of the public:

Resolved, That the attendance at the North Carolina Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis calls to the attention of all religious bodies and business organizations, manufacturers and employers, the great need of the popular enlightenment of the citizens of the State and for institutions for the cure of unfortunate sufferers, and recommends that the representatives from the various counties of North Carolina be instructed to pay especial attention to the enactment of such legislation as will aid to provide for an adequate appropriation to provide for the establishment and maintenance of such institutions, and that every legitimate organization of the State lend its co-operation to wage a campaign for the results commensurate with our needs.

Be it further resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the religious bodies, trade and business organizations, and leading papers of the State, and that every board of trade and chamber of commerce be requested to adopt resolutions expressing the desire of their various communities, and publicly request the representatives of their respective communities, when elected, to vote for an adequate appropriation to aid in preventing and curing tubercular patients throughout the State, when the next General Assembly convenes in Raleigh in 1911.

SECOND ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE SOUTHERN APPALACHIAN GOOD ROADS CONVENTION.

The second annual convention of the Southern Appalachian Good Roads Convention will be held at Knoxville, Tenn., on October 5 and 6, 1910. This will be one of the more important good roads conventions to be held in the South during the year and large delegations are expected from the six States, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Kentucky, which are interested in the Association. The program for the Convention has not been fully completed, but the delegates to this Convention and others interested in good roads can rest assured that a most interesting program will be arranged, which will include discussions of various problems pertinent to the construction and maintenance of our public roads, such as location, grade drainage, surfacing materials, culverts, dust preventatives, tar and asphalt macadam, use of convicts in public road construction, wide tires, etc.

The Governors of the six States interested in the Convention have been asked to make addresses and will be invited to attend the Convention as guests of the City of Knoxville. All of them will not be able to be present, but the Governors of South Carolina, Tennessee, and Kentucky have signified their intentions to be present and the Governor of North Carolina may be able to arrange his engagements so as to be present. All the Governors of these six States are strong good roads advocates and are ready to assist in every way possible the extension of the good roads movement throughout the Southern Appalachian region. A number of our Senators and

Congressmen have accepted invitations to take part in the Convention and, when we stop to consider that this is an election year, the fact that our Congressmen and other public officials are willing to attend our Convention indicates the very widespread interest there is in the subject of good public roads and that our people are aroused to the necessity of concerted action in obtaining them.

Mr. S. W. McCallie, State Geologist of Georgia.

Mr. E. J. Watson, Commissioner of Agriculture of South Carolina.

Honorable M. O. Eldridge, of the U. S. Office of Public Roads.

There will also be representatives of various cities, boards of trade, county and State good roads associations, etc., who will make short addresses in connection with various subjects that will be taken up for discussion.

The headquarters of the Convention will be at the Hotel Atkin, Knoxville, Tenn., but the meetings will be held in the auditorium in the Appalachian Exposition Grounds. It would be an advantage for the delegates to make reservations regarding lodging before reaching Knoxville, and they can correspond with Mr. James S. Hensley, Secretary Board of Trade of Knoxville, regarding hotels and boarding houses.
