### CITY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

Now is the time when every parent and teacher should caution the boys and hunters about the use of fireworks and firearms. Accidental injury from these occur much oftener during the holiday seasons than at any other time. A careless act with one of these can mar the holiday joy and the holiday spirit for an entire community.

Doubtless some of the patrons think the superintendent quite ultra in his attitude towards these things. But where 400 or 500 children are gathered on one small lot, it takes extreme measures to protect them against themselves. It is against the laws of the city for any one to fire any kind of explosives within the city limits. The cap pistols are harmless if you could guard against their being fired near the face. But who can tell where a boy is going to fire? In view of the fact that many cases of lockjaw are recorded each Christmas from the effects of cap pistols the superintendent considers them very dangerous among many little fellows at school. It is hoped that each parent will see the wisdom of this and support the school very heartily in trying to protect the property against fire and the little ones against Injury.

When a parent receives a special report on his child, he should thank the teacher for the interest that sent it. It sometimes seems that the kind of interest that tries to urge the pupils to higher endeavor is not appreciated. Patrons sometimes put a premium on indifference and lax requirements by failing to show appreciation for the teacher who is after the lazy, indifferent boy or girl. Parents often do not know how inattentive to duty and how lazy their children are. In a recent investigation as to the cause of failure, about fifty per cent, of those asked for a candid answer gave a lack of study on their part as the cause.

Not long since a girl of the fifth grade was reported to the superintendent for failing in her work. She was sent to the office and the following conversation passed:

Supt .- Little girl, what is the cause of this bad report?

Little Girl-Mr. Wray, I'll tell you the truth; there were just too many interesting things in town.

Supt .- Now, tell me what things in your opinion were so interesting as to interfere with your work? Little Girl-The circus was one of

Supt .- But the circus only accounts for one day. You surely can lose one day in the month and not

Little Girl-Well there were parties and meetings till one just couldn't do her work justice.

In many cases the teacher would be held responsible for this failure. If a girl of this kind were sent away to a school where they shut out these things and where they give all the time during the month to study. she would doubtless make a better record. Then that record would be compared with the one made in the home school, the extra cost not taken into consideration, and the home school would be censured.

If the parents do not look after the children and see that outside things do not take their minds off of the work, and if they do not let the children stay in school there are going to be many failures this year, and it will be the fault of no one but those that should do the work. There is no danger of failure on the part of those on the sub-joined honor roll if they contine as they have begun.

This is the last school communication till 1911. The superintendent and the teachers have "good will" to each and every pupil and patron, and they wish and hope that Old Santa may find each one with an abundance of love, good cheer, good things that will make him happy without making him selfish.
