JUDGE HARDING.

Mr. W. F. Harding, of Charlotte, Succeeds Judge Duls-Began Service Yesterday.

Saturday Governor Craig appointed Mr. W. F. Harding, of the Charlotte bar, a Superior Court judge for the fourteenth judicial district to succeed Judge C. H. Duls, of the same city, who resigned recently on account of ill health. Mr. Harding took the oath of office in Charlotte yesterday morning and at once took his seat as presiding Judge over Mecklenburg Superior Court. Eunday's Charlotte Observer says

of him: Mr. William F. Harding, of the Charlotte bar, who was appointed judge of the fourteenth judicial district by Governor Locke Craig yesterday in the place of Judge C. h. Duls resigned, is a native of Aurora, Bertie councy, this State, where ne was born 46 years ago. After receiving an elementary, intermediate and high school education in the local schools, he entered the University of North Carolina where he was graduated with the class of 1894. After completing the college course, in 1896. Receiving his lihe entered the law school and fincense he went to Greenville, county, where he practiced six years with his brother, Mr. F. C. Harding, a leading attorney of that city. Mr. Harding then came to Charlotte, locating here on January 1, 1903, where he has been practicing ever since, achieving a notable success in his own profession.

Judge Harding succeeds Judge Duls who was forced to resign recently on account of ill healtn. He will hold his first term of court here this week, beginning tomorrow.

TO MEET IN CHARLOTTE.

Sixth Annual Convention of the North Carolina Drainage Associa-

There will be held at Charlotte, North Carolina, November 18th and 19, the Sixth Annual Convention of the North Carolina Drainage Association. Since the organization of this association in 1909 and the passage of the general Drainage Act of the State, about 70 drainage districts have been started. Of these 41 have been completed, representing an area of 417,900 acres of swamp land. About 60,000 acres are now being drained and 91,000 acres petitioned for, covering twenty-three counties of the Coastai Plain Region. Drainage districts been organized in Piedmont and Western North Carolina in 15 counties representing a total area or 52,471 acres of overflowed land. From data which has been collected it appears that the drainage of these lands has enormously increased their agricultural value, and the money value of these lands has increased from \$10 to \$150 per acre, with an estimated average value of \$65.00. This will give an aggregate increase of land values for those areas, many of which before draining yielded no returns whatever, of \$40,000,000; and increases the general healthfulness of those sections from 75 per cent to 100 per cent.

At this Convention there will be addresses from many prominent speakers and engineers will be present, who will be in a position to give information of practical value to those who are interested in the formation of drainage districts. Evryone interested in this form of conservation not only from the standpoint of increased land values but in the conservation of public health s most cordially invited to attend the sessions of the Convention, and

will be considered as delegates. There will be a discussion of the North Carolina Drainage Law, and recommendations made as to any changes in it, which will help to promote the drainage work of
