Mrs. J. A. Satterfield Dead. The many friends and former parishioners of Rev. J. A. Satterfield will regret deeply to learn of the death of his wife, Mrs. Sallie M. Satterfield, which occurred at eight o'clock Friday night, December 5th, at their home on North Caldwell street, Charlotte. Mrs. Satterfield's death came after a lingering illness of many months during which she bore her sufferings with true Christian patience and fortitude. Funeral services were conducted at the home Saturday afternoon at three o'clock by Rev. D. H. Rolston, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Charlotte, and the remains were laid to rest in Elmwood cemetery beside the grave of their little daughter who died about two years ago. The deceased is survived by her husband and one small daughter, Ruth, aged four years, and by her mother and several sisters. During their residence of some time in Gastonia, while Rev. Mr. Satterfield was pastor of the Loray Presbyterian church, Mr. and Mrs. Satterfield won many warm friends, all of whom will deeply sympathize with the minister in his bereavement.

RENOUNCES FAITH.

Former Catholic Priest With 200 Followers Joins Episcopal Church. South Bend, Ind., Dec. 8.—Renouncing his faith in the Roman Catholic Church and also his title as bishop in the National Catholic Church of America, which he has organized here after his controversy with Bishop H. J. Aldering of Fort Wayne, Rev. Victor Van Kubinyi and his entire congregation of more than 200 marched bareheaded, into St. James' Episcopal Church of this city and embraced the Episcopal rite. Kubinyi was immediately ordained an Episcopalian rector.

DOCTORS AT LINCOLNTON.

Physicians of Seventh District Had Good Meeting and Large Attendance.

Lincoln County News, 5th. After carrying out the program as announced in this paper, the meeting of the Seventh District Medical Society adjourned Tuesday afternoon at 5 o'clock. There were about 75 doctors present from the various counties in the district. Each of the nine counties was represented with the exception of Cabarrus and Stanly. The meeting was one of the best ever held in this district and was a success in every way. One of the features of the meeting was the demonstration by moving picture film of germ life in the human blood, by Dr. J. P. Munroe, of Charlotte.

Officers were elected as follows: President, Dr. J. B. Wright; vice-president, Dr. H. D. Stewart, Monroe; secretary, Dr. R. H. LaFerty, Charlotte. Place of next meeting will be Concord. Clinical conference will be held in Charlotte next March.

The Lincoln County Medical Society gave a banquet to the visiting physicians Monday night at the North State Hotel, at which 40-odd covers were laid. A delightful affair of Tuesday afternoon was the reception given in honor of the visiting physicians at Fassifern. Miss Shipp had extended an invitation to the visitors and upon adjournment of the business session at 5 o'clock the doctors went to Fassifern in a body, where they spent an enjoyable hour. Mrs. W. A. Hoke and little daughter, Miss Mary, assisted the faculty and student body in receiving. Light refreshments were served during the evening and the doctors departed voting this occasion one of the most delightful during their visit.

The visiting physicians were high in their praise of the entertainment accorded them by the Lincoln County Medical Society, and the citizens of Lincolnton in general. Mr. Charles H. Wilmoth, a prominent citizen of Charlotte, and for 17 years manager of the Charlotte branch of Chas. M. Steff & Co., piano manufacturers, died suddenly at his home on South Myers street in that city Saturday morning. Mr. Wilmoth was a prominent mason, and after funeral services conducted at the home Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock by Rev. D. H. Rolston, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, he was buried with Masonic honors in Elmwood cemetery.

Shows a Falling Off.

According to the records in the office of Register of Deeds A. J. Smith at the court house the year ending December 1, 1913, showed a considerable falling off in the number of marriage licenses issued in this county. The number is 360 as against 414 for the previous year. That was, however, the banner year in the county's history and this year ranks second. Asked for an explanation of this decrease in the number of young couples wishing to be married, Mr. Smith said it was probably attributable to the high cost of living. In fact, however, under the more stringent regulations regulating the issuance of marriage licenses, Mr. Smith has, during the year, refused more licenses than during any previous year. The number turned down, if issued, would have made this year's record exceed that of last year.
