The best method of destroying it is to plow in the hot weather of midsummer, leaving the land as rough as possible. Plow again in November and sow to oats, and when that crop is harvested, plow again and sow thickly with cowpeas, which will smother the few remaining plants and leave the soil in good condition for future crops.
