At Spencer Mountain.

At Spencer Mountain on the South Fork considerable, damage was done to the property of the Spencer Mountain Cotton Mills as well as the Spencer Mountain power plant. Authentic reports are to the effect. that the water reached the roof of the buildings nearest the river early Sunday night which necessarily put out of commission the power plant. Later reports from there today are to the effect that more than two feet of mud has settled in the power plant and a part of the machin-ery has been ruined, although it is thought that the dynamos can be renovated and used again. At the mill the water rose several feet in the card room. several feet in the card room, the machinery was partly submerged and a slight damage was done to several hundred bales of cotton in the warehouse. The race near the lower end of the dam broke through for about 20 feet, which will cause the mill management considerable damage and inconvenience. The dam stands without damage, it is stated by employees of the mill. No figures are available as to the damage done at this mill but conservative estimates are to the effect that it will run into the thousands.
