BELMONT NEWS BUDGET

Gazette Bureau, Belmont Hotel, Belmont, Oct. 16.

As a result of a shooting here Saturday night at 8 o'clock occasioned by an attempted arrest by Officers Brigham and Noles of some negroes who were gambling, Sam Fisher, colored, lies at the point of death with two bullet wounds, one through his skull and one through his stomach and Policeman Noles is shot through the fleshy part of the thigh.

When the two officers attempted to arrest the negroes they resisted and were putting up a nasty scrap, having Brigham down on the ground, when he drew his gun and shot Fisher in self-defense. Noles, who was on special Saturday night duty, was shot by one of the negroes. It is not thought that Fisher will live through the night.

In an accident Saturday morning at the Southern Railway trestle over the Catawba river, C. E. Moser, of Greensboro, bridge foreman, had his left leg crushed completely off just above the ankle and was otherwise injured about the body and hips when the boom on the derrick struck a telephone pole knocking it on the man.

A workman named Hall from High Point was also injured. Both men were rushed to Belmont where physicians' services were secured. They were taken to the Presbyterian Hospital in Charlotte on train No. 36. Both men were engaged with the Southern's construction and double-track force at the river here.

CONGRESSMAN R. N. PAGE.

taxing a people it will make them rich. Such argument is nothing short of fallacious.

At this point he paid a very complimentary tribute to congressman E. Y. Webb, saying that he couldn't conceive of any Republican, regardless of who he was, winning out over Yates Webb because he had never met any man in Congress during the past 14 years there who had stood more nearly four-square to the world and had done his duty more conscientiously and loyally than E. Y. Webb, congressman from this district. (Applause.)

Mr. Page challenged any Republican to show where Mr. Hughes has offered any one piece of constructive legislation in all of his speeches during the past several weeks. He stated that Hughes had only gone about over the country a harping critic, and while he has criticized President Wilson's Mexican policy he has not said what he would have done. "If Roosevelt and Hughes had had their way," he declared, "hundreds of American mothers would be weeping and the bones of their sons would be bleached on the cactus plains of Mexico. Under this patient statesman, this man of unlimited patience, the ship of state has been steered safely through the treacherous waters during the past four years and has misused every shoal, given peace to our country and with honor. And because of the fairness and impartiality with which Wilson has discharged every duty placed upon him he is going to be continued as the helm of this country for the next four years."

Turning to State affairs the speaker declared that the Democratic party comes again to the people standing on its record of accomplishments while the Republicans try to forget their past record. He showed that the boss of the Republican party in this State, the man who named Lincoln and every other Republican candidate, the man who dominated the didate, the man who dominated the State convention was Jefferson Butler, the man who had betrayed his State by the manipulation of repudiated bonds. "The Republicans charge is that the Democrats have spent a lot on the school system of this State. The Democratic party has spent a great deal on its educational system and it has been worth every cent that it cost and the Democrats of the State are proud of the advances made along educational lines. He showed that taxes in this State were lower than every State in the Union with the exception of South Carolina. Of the 17 counties in the State governed by Republicans the taxes are 8 cents higher than in the Democratic managed counties. North Carolina, he stated, had made a greater percentage of gain in every line of human endeavor than any State in the Union under the Demo-

cratic administration. Closing his address with a plea to the Republicans who were once Democrats and had left their party because of prejudice, the speaker asked them to consider their error and return again to their right party and home. He declared that Gaston county ought to give Woodrow Wilson and the Democratic ticket a majority of at least 1,000 on November 7th. He was loudly applauded at the close.
