Southern Will Operate Nos. 37 and 38 in Two Sections During Holfdays in Order to Take Care of Extra Business.

ATLANTA, GA., Dec. 15 .- In order to take care of the increased travel incident to the Christmas holiday season and also to provide adequate facilities for handling the large volume of mail and express. the Southern Railway has arranged to operate trains 37 and 38 in two sections between Washington and Atlanta, December 15th to 25th Inclusive, and trains 35 and 36 in two sections between Washington and Atlanta December 17th to 24th Inclusive. The first sections of these trains will carry passengers exclusively and will be operated on the regular schedules now in effect, the second section to follow 15 minutes later with the baggage and mail.' Extra equipment will be provided on these trains and arrangements also have been made to handle additional equipment in trains 29 and 30 between Atlanta and Washington, trains 42 and 43 between Atlanta and Charlotte, trains 23 and 24 between Atlanta and Jacksonville, and on other trains additional sleeping cars and coaches will be added as the travel may demand.-(Adv.)


