Peace Without Annexations or Indemnities Acceptable to Rumania -Entered War Seeking the Lib-

(Through its exclusive news sources in Europe the International News Service has just received the following interesting exposition of Rumania's aims in the war from the pen of that nation's Prime Minister. This statement has added interest on account of the near arrival of a Rumanian commission in Washington.)

By M. BRATIANO, Prime Minister of Rumania.

Now that the Russian republic has announced to the entire world its new formula of "peace without annexations or indemnities and to each nation the right to govern itself,' and wishes to have its allies accept these terms, I may say that Rumania, for her part, finds the terms acceptable.

Rumania never entered the war on the side of the Entente Allies for the purpose of making conquests or seeking to enrich herself at others ex-

Her one and only aim was and territory held by Hungary and the

To free our Rumanian brothers, to to their own country, is the sole reason my country took up arms. The Russian republic does not in any manner, therefore, oblige Rumania ney celebration. to change her aims in the war, which will continue the same and for which my countrymen have decided to fight with all their strength to the bitter end.

Despite the terrible circumstances in which we find ourselves, my countrymen will hold to the terms of their alliance and faithfully carry out their agreements.

We have been invaded by a strong enemy, who has overrun half of our country and captured our capital; we have suffered from famine and sickness, but we have made a great and almost superhuman effort to reorganize our army

Today we are in a position to begin an active campaign against our enenties and to pursue with vigor the battle which we have never abandon-

In the crisis which now confronts us, at the moment when the war appears to be nearing the beginning of the end. Rumania, who has fulfilled all her obligations to her allies, has the right to expect that-her allies will remain faithful to the terms of the treaties which bind them togeth-

The fulfillment of treaty obliga-

tions and the respect for promises made constitute the very basic foundations of the lives of nations as well as the lives of the people who compose them.
