Trains Taken Off.

Beginning Sunday, July 8, the Southern Railway inaugurated a new schedule, taking off train No. 11. westbound, and train No. 40, eastbound. This change is in accordance with the policy which the government has asked the railroads to adopt. curtailing their service where it would not greatly interfere with public traffic in order to release rolling stock and operatives for transportation of tfroops and supplies for the federal forces.

elly International News Service.) LONDON, July 7 .- Into the heart of London a squadron of German airplanes between 30 and 40 strong, struck terror, death and ruin in broad daylight today.
