The Americanism of Hoover. New York World.

Senator Reed, of Missouri, who pretends to think that President Wiison is "outkaisering the Kaiser and out-Ceasaring Caesar," because the administration has asked for power to prevent the food gamblers from starving the American people, is also attacking Herbert C. Hoover as lacking "sympathy with American ideals and principles."

Mr. Hoover is one of the most eminent of American mining engineers. He gave up an income of \$150,000 a year to administer the relief work in Belgium. He not only worked for nothing but he even paid out of his own pocket the rent of the house in Brussels occupied by the relief commission. His assistants served without pay, too, and every penny that was contributed for Belgian relief went for Belgian relief.

In Washington Mr. Hoover is again working for nothing and paying his own expenses. His assistants are again serving without pay. All the great work that he has undertaken is a voluntary contribution on his part to the American people. He has asked for nothing except the opportunity to put his great administrative abilities and his unique experience in food control at the service of his fellow countrymen to help them win the war.

To Senator Reed this shows a lack of sympathy with American ideals and principles." Hoover is working for nothing when he might be getting rich out of the war: He has given his time and talents to the Government and the people when with his intimate knowledge of food markets and food operations he might be cornering necessaries of life and gouging the poor and the destitute. Hoover is the kind of American who helps in war and not the kind who profits. James A. Reed, of Missouri, Senator in Congress of the United States, therefore doubts Herbert C. Hoover's Americanism, which is a sufficient commentary on the Americanism—and the brains—of James A. Reed, of Missouri.


