County Demonstration Agent J. M. Gray has sent out a circular letter announcing dates of farmers' meetings to be held in the county during the remainder of this month. INVENTS WAY TO MAKE NEW PAPER FROM OLD.

(By International News Service.) GREEN BAY, Wis., July 12. -John Welsh, manager of a local paper company, has invented a process whereby he says waste paper can be reclaimed and made into newsprint paper.

Mr. Welsh states that by his process all waste paper can be resolved into fresh paper as often as brought back to the mill.

The paper is of a bluish-gray color and is said to have a greater strength than ordinary newsprint. Local publishers who have used the laundered paper say it gives excellent results.


