

(By International News Service.) PARIS, Aug. 4 .- Despite the boggy condition of the ground, the Ai lies are moving forward their heavy artillery to continue the "drive" in Flanders. Dispatches from the front today pay a tribute to the Prussian guardsmen who obeyed orders to

"die rather than retreat." There were no prisoners taken by the Welsh, who fought these troops. Elsewhere, noticeably at Hooge, the Germans had rushed mere boys to the front line. Prisoners taken from among them complained bitterly that they were told that they would only be used as extreme reserves.
