TO MEET IN GREENSBORO.

Physicians Will Discuss Monday, August 20, the Medical Reserve Corps Situation and the Needs of the Hour.

(State Health Bulletin.)

A meeting of the North Carolina Auxiliary Societies and the State Committee of National Defense, Medical Section, will be held in Greensboro Monday, August 20, for the discussion of the needs of the hour and the Medical Reserve Corps situation. The conference will be of the greatest importance, according to Dr. J. W. Long, of Greensboro, Chairman, State Committee National Defense, Medical Section, who is sending out the call.

At the Greensboro meeting, Dr. A. W. Knox, of Raleigh, Special Examiner Medical Reserve Corps, Chairman of the Wake County Auxiliary Society and member of the Wake County Exemption Board, will preside.

In addition to the discussion of the Medical Reserve Corps situation, the pressing needs of the hour, occasioned by the war and the necessity for service on the part of the physicians of the State, will be discussed by Major R. E. Noble, U. S. A., and Dr. Joseph C. Bloodgood, Chairman of the Southern Committee for National Defense.

The State Committee is urgent in its request upon the physicians in the State to attend the meeting. It is desired that every county in North Carolina be represented. Particularly is the invitation extended to the officers and the active workers of the County Auxiliary Societies, every physician who has been commissioned or who has applied for a commission in the Medical Reserve Corps, and all other physicians in the State who are interested in securing an adequate supply of physicians for the Army and Navy Health Service.

For the convenience of those who will be in Greensboro only during the afternoon and evening sessions of the conference, reservations have been made at the Guilford Hotel where they may have a place to wash and rest. It is urged that those who will attend notify the Chairman, Dr. J. W. Long, of Greensboro, as soon as possible.

Dr. J. W. Long is making a patriotic appeal to the physicians of the State, urging them to comply with the demand for medical men for war service. "The Nation looks to the profession," he declares, "because, forsooth, there is nowhere else to look to furnish these men. Brethren, shall we perform this patriotic duty and do it now? To fail to respond to our country's call when we are so urgently needed is to confess our lack of patriotism. Shall we send our soldier boys to the blood-soaked fields of France and not go with them to bind up their wounds, to render succor in their hour of distress? Shall we sit by, thinking only of our own personal comfort and safety while our boys are being sent into the maelstrom of death? Has the significance of that benevolent society now being organized which has for its purpose the bringing back home of the bodies of our American soldiers slain in battle, occurred to you? Brethren, we fear that some of us are 'asleep at the switch.'"

The public has been given 48 hours of reflection on the significance of the Vatican's plan for advancing matters to a final settlement of the war on a basis of world-wide peace, and with reflection the possibilities of the Pope's overture become more manifest. The opinion is being steadily formed that it is by far a more important document than was at first apparent. It is the first thing that has happened since the war began to cause the mind of the world to halt, even momentarily, in consideration of a possible peace. It is one proposal to which the Allies will at least have to make reply—and that may be an important step gained.
