PARIS, Nov. 23.—The Germans captured only 209 officers and 1,873 privates against 682 German officers and 44,252 privates taken by the doughboys, says American headquarters figures today. All the seriously wounded Americans will have been transported to America within three months. The seriously sick will follow.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—The last of the German crews were today removed from the great German battle fleet which surrendered in the North sea Thursday.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—The Allies moving into Germany have reached the Rhine frontier, says dispatches from Copenhagen today. Many Germans in upper Alsace are deserting.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—"It is for the whole world, which has borne the burdens of the war, a share in the adjustments of peace," the President today assured citizens of Schleswig who urged that he "speak soon in order that those of our people who were less fortunate than we may be granted the simple elementary rights of self-determination and self-government for the preservation of which we and our children are now working and fighting abroad." The President assured the Schleswigers that their appeal for justice will not go unheeded.

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—The cotton market closed with December contracts selling at 28.40, and March at 27.20.

ing the ardor of the people in the new German-Austrian state to become a part of federated Germany. Cool heads among the business men are advising the new government against rushing to join Germany, sharing other enormous burdens besides its own. The Allies are watching this situation closely as well as the other international moves of Germany. There is no disposition in Paris to believe that Germany is in any danger of falling into Bolshevism.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—The Germans taken prisoners by the Americans total forty four thousand and the captured big guns, howitzers and trench guns reached a total of fourteen hundred. The first combat divisions to return to the United States will be the thirty first, thirty fourth, thirty-eighth, thirty-ninth, seventy-sixth, eighty-fourth, eighty-sixth and eighty-seventh. The forty-sixth to fiftieth coast artillery inoperative will be among the first to sail. The sixty-fifth and one hundred and sixty third brigades are to the first artillery to embark. The American army will occupy Coblenz, arriving about December first. Reports circulated that entire units were wiped out just before the signing of the armistice are declared untrue.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—Continuing its advance through the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg, the third American army last night reached the line Ingeldef-Detsdorf-Remick-Schangen, General Pershing reported today.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—Dictatorships have been established at Dusseldorf and Frankfurt by the German radicals led by the Spartacus group, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen today. The extremists control Soling and Rensched. Fighting again broke out in

There is strong counter revolutionary unrest. The Spartacus group are German extremists and are accused of stirring Bolsheviki leanings.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—The capitol today is still reeling over the shock caused by the announcement of the retirement of Secretary McAdoo. Accepting as absolutely true the statement that he is compelled to quit as Secretary of the Treasury and railroad director to recoup his fortune, officialdom is generally criticizing a system that "puts a premium on rich men". Suggestions that there are political reasons behind his resignation are sharply and bitterly resented in administration circles. Even his cabinet colleagues were ignorant of his intentions.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—America lost in killed in action and by death from wounds 36,154 officers and men, General March announced this afternoon. Other casualties are: Death from disease, 14,811; unclassified, 2,204; wounded, 179,625; prisoners, 2,163; missing in action 1,160; grand total, 236,117.
