

YESTERDAY'S TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

(By International News Service.)

PARIS, Dec. 16.—President Wilson today got his first view of Versailles palace, where the final and formal sessions of the peace conference will be held. He made the trip by motor, and was deeply interested. He was shown through the courtyard and declined an invitation to enter and inspect the magnificent "Hall of Mirrors." The trip consumed two hours. Returning to Paris, President Wilson lunched with Mr. Page, the American ambassador to Italy, who advised him that the king of Italy would call up on him Thursday. The President with Col. House visited the war office to return Premier Clemenceau's call.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—America's winter wheat crop will break all records, according to a forecast made public this afternoon by the Department of Agriculture, reporting the condition of the condition as 95.5 per cent on December first. A 760 million bushel crop of fall-sown wheat was forecast.

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 16.—Beland has severed relations with Germany, says a Warsaw wireless dispatch today.

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 16.—The former Kaiser refused to leave Holland after official representations were made to him that his stay will likely involve the country in serious difficulties and that his "voluntary departure would be a matter of gratification," says the newspaper Telegraph today.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—A provisional government headed by Admiral Cantorostro, the secretary of state was formed in Portugal as a result of the assassination of President Paes at Lisbon at midnight Saturday night, says official information which reached here today.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN GERMANY, Dec. 16.—The Americans are now a two days march beyond the Rhine. Their peaceful penetration of Prussia is clearing the hearts of the German children. Adults are becoming friendlier. The weather is clearing.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—German troops arriving at Berlin from the front have taken sides against the terrorists and have driven out the marines who had established themselves in the former Kaiser's castle, said an Amsterdam dispatch this afternoon.

PARIS, Dec. 16.—Premier Clemenceau is understood to have indicated his desire to President Wilson that the peace treaty be settled before debating the formation of a league of nations and the matter of disarmament. The conference was of the friendliest character. President Wilson is plainly satisfied that real progress was made.

PARIS, Dec. 16.—The United States entered the war not only because they were moved by conviction that the purpose of the Central empire was wrong and must be resisted by men everywhere who loved liberty and right, but also because the illicit ambitions they were entertaining and attempting to realize led to practices which shocked our hearts as much as they offended our principles," declared President Wilson today in responding to the state reception given him at the hotel de Ville. The speech was delivered to a brilliant throng of notables, including President Poincare and many diplomats and high statesmen. "The shameful ruin wrought by the enemy and the cruel and unnecessary suffering brought up in the Allied peoples filled our hearts with indignation," said President Wilson.

BIRMINGHAM, Dec. 16.—President Baugh, of the southern baseball association, resigned today. President Martin, of the Memphis club, will probably be his successor.

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 17.—Five persons were killed and 40 wounded in political riots at Dresden, says a Berlin dispatch today. The fight was precipitated by the extremists.

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 17.—The Bolshevik government has begun to evacuate Petrograd, moving the archives toward Nijni, Novgorod, according to information received here today.

ATHENS, Dec. 17.—The Allied fleet bombarded a detachment of young Turks who had barricaded themselves at Smyrna, defying the Entente forces.

CHICAGO, Dec. 17.—Miss Jane Adams today declares that the stories that she is a candidate for mayor of Chicago are "silly and stupid."

LONDON, Dec. 17.—The Dutch government is preparing a petition to the German government to insure the safety of William Hohenzollern on a trip to Berlin, says a Rotterdam dispatch stating that the ex-kaiser may return soon.
