RED CROSS HELPING FAMILIES OF SOLDIERS.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21. - "How will they reach my family; they live across a mountain ridge thirty miles by horseback from the nearest town?"

This was the question put recently by soldier who was telling his family troubles to a Red Cross Associate field director in charge of home service in one of the camps near Washington. The Red Cross man had informed him that a visitor from the home service section at the chapter headquarters would be asked by wire to visit his family and to help them in their distress.

The report of the Department of Civilian Relief of the American Red Cross for the year 1918, just issued, shows that every part of the country where families of soldiers and sailors live is covered by representatives of Red Cross Home Service. Buckboards, boats, horses, sleds, snowshoes and the ubiquitous Ford are actually in use at present in the effort to reach every family reported in need, no matter how remote the place nor how rough the road. Red Cross organization for this work extends not only to all parts of Continental United States, but also to Alaska, the Phillippines, the Canal Zone, all the Insular possessions, and to every part of the globe where there are colonies of American families. It also has its connections or representatives in all the nations which have been at war, either through American Red Cross commissions or through the Red Cross organizations of those countries.

The total number of home service sections is by this time nearly 10,000 and the number of workers, mostly volunteers, is close to 60,000.
