WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Gen. Pershing has been authorized to send back to the United States for immediate discharge all soldiers presenting convincing testimony that sickness or other distress in the soldiers' family demands his presence at home, the War Department announced this afternoon.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The creation of comparatively few railroad companies with a capitalization based on real values of properties, with a moderate guaranteed return, is the solution of the country's railroad problem, stated Railroad Director General Walker Hines before the Senate railroad committee today. Mr. Hines emphatically declared that either the railroads should be retained under governmental control for five years or returned to private ownership at the earliest possible date, asserting personally he opposed government ownership but declared the promoters of government ownership should be given a fair hearing, which it is impossible to secure now, because of the psychological reaction against "too much government" engendered during the war. He branded as unfair the judgment based on operation during war, when results and not cost were counted.
