From Pvt. Samuel S. Pasour. Following are some extracts from a letter which Mrs. Ernest Payne, of Bessemer City, recently received from her brother, Pvt. Samuel S. Pasour, Ward C 4, Base Hospital No. 24, France, Limoges, France, Dec. 6.

My Dear Sister: I will try to send you a few lines by a soldier to mail in the States. I am well and having a nice time. I have been here in Limoges in a base hospital since the latter part of Oct. I am working here now. We can go to town almost every day. A French town is much queerer than an American town, and not as nice.

I have been in France almost 4 months. I left Hoboken, N. J., June 20th and landed in Liverpool dock the night of July 1st and left the ship on July 2nd. I came over on a big British vessel, the Orkuna. A convoy of 13 vessels and a battleship accompanied us until we met a fleet of destroyers. We went to the front in August on the St. Mihiel front close to Toul. I was in all of the St. Mihiel drive and went over the top on the 12th of Sep-

tember for the first, but was over several other times later. We were relieved and I was only out of the lines for a few days and went to the Verdun front in the Argonne. I was in a battle and a very hot one on Hill 272 which another division tried several times to take but could not succeed. We went in action and took it, but with very heavy losses. I got another dose of gas and was sent here.

I will send this back with one of the soldier boys who is leaving here with a large crowd. I must close, your brother, PVT. SAMUEL S. PASOUR.

From Lloyd J. Warren. Following are some extracts from a letter which Miss Edna Warren recently received from her brother, Lloyd J. Warren, of Co. C, 64th Infantry:

Dear Sister: This leaves me well, I always feel good; think I had better stay over here all the time. I guess all the people at home are still talking war, we don't talk war any more, we just talk about when we can get a ship headed the other way. Well I have seen the biggest part of France already, think I will see the rest before I get back. I wish I could see you and tell you about the sunny France. I am not in the same company any more, I was transferred to the 21st M. G. Co. and like it fine. I was in the trenches and came out all o. k. I didn't mind it at all when I got used to it, but I am glad that it is all over.
