TAR HEEL CANNING BULLETIN POPULAR IN OTHER STATES.

RALEIGH, March 12.—"I earned nearly 200 jars of fruit and vegetables by the methods contained in your bulletin," writes a lady in New Jersey to the Agricultural Extension Service, "and not one of them spoiled. Will you please send copies to each of my neighbors who are planning to garden and can this summer?"

The circular prepared by Mrs. Jane S. M. Kimmon on canning and preserving contains the standard recipes used by North Carolina club girls and women, and it is recognized as one of the best bulletins of its kind. MONDAY'S TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

(By International News Service.)

ON BOARD THE GEORGE WASHINGTON, March 10.—President Wilson has contracted a slight cold, but was improved today. The President did not expose himself to the sea air but remained in his quarters. The present plans call for the President to land at Brest on Thursday, the 13th, proceeding immediately to Paris. A number of wireless messages have been received from Colonel House and Secretary Lansing, who are in Paris.

WASHINGTON, March 10.—The jail sentence of Eugene V. Debs, socialist candidate for the presidency, was sustained by the supreme court of the United States this afternoon.

COPENHAGEN, March 10.—German government airmen bombarded Leipzig on Sunday, said a dispatch to the Politiken from Dresden today. The airmen flew from Weimar, the seat of the German national assembly. Government troops have surrounded Leipzig and expect to occupy it sometime today, thus giving them complete domination of that community.

LONDON, March 10.—Fighting has again broken out in Berlin between the Spartacists and government troops. Battles took place in the district of Moabit prison and Spittel market on Saturday morning, said a dispatch from Berlin. Government airmen are flanked by heaps of ruined houses and thousands of persons have been made homeless. Many persons fled from Berlin. During the air bombardments many took refuge in basements.

PARIS, March 10.—The committee on responsibility for the war has decided that the ex-Kaiser can be tried by an inter-Allied court, according to El Intransigent today.

WORCHESTER, Mass., March 10.—One man was instantly killed and three others seriously injured by an explosion today in the Chandler street plant of the Baldwin Chain Co. The cause of the explosion is not known. The building in which the men were working was partially destroyed by fire.

BERNE, March 10.—Moscow under the Bolsheviks is described by travellers arriving here as "an abode of manias." The Bolshevik prisoners are led from prison by the Bolshevik jailer and shot in public for the amusement of mobs. Outrages are perpetrated upon women of the upper classes.

PARIS, March 10.—The question of writing the Monroe doctrine into the League of Nations, which was suggested in certain quarters of the United States, is causing some anxiety here. It is pointed out that if this is done, it would open the way for other nations to insert measures which might operate in a discriminatory way towards the United States.

WASHINGTON, March 10.—Director General Hines, of the railroad administration, is expected to map out a definite plan for solving most of the financial problems of the railroads, brought about by the failure of Congress to pass the 750 million dollar appropriation for railroads, when he held a conference today with members of the United States war finance corporation and leading bankers of the country.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilkinson will make their home for the present with the bride's mother in West Gastonia, Mr. Wilkinson having accepted a position here. Both have many friends who will be interested in the news of their marriage.
