Killed in action, 7; died of wounds, 7; died of accident or other cause, 10; died of disease, 85; wounded severely, 13; wounded, degree undetermined, 56; wounded slightly, 129; missing in action, 2; total, 300.

SUNDAY'S CASUALTY LISTS CONTAINED 111 NAMES.

WASHINGTON, March 16.—The following army casualties are reported by the commanding general of the American expeditionary forces:
Died of Disease, 47; wounded severely, 7; wounded, degree undetermined, 25; wounded slightly, 32; total, 111.

The only North Carolinian listed today is Private Albert M. Chappell, of Durham, who was slightly wounded.

WASHINGTON, March 15.—Attorney General Mitchell Palmer is today moving to protect the public against the high prices of meat products which might result from hoarding by speculators of available supplies. The food administration's action in letting down the bars by restrictions against storage for over 60 days aroused a storm of protest from many quarters, especially from official Washington which is trying to force down the cost of living.
