#### WASHINGTON SAYS "WOUNDED"; DISCHARGED SOLDIER SAYS "NO"

After being overseas for more than six months as a member of the American Expeditionary Forces, being in the front fine trenches a number of times where he and some hard fighting and escaping without being wounded, to return to American soil, receive his discharge from the army and to resume his civil pursuits and then to be officially notified by the War Department that he had been wounded slightly, is the experience that a Gastonia boy, Mr. Robert S. McLean, has undergone. Mr. McLean, a son of Mr. and Mrs. A. A. McLean, was ser geant in Company A, 115th Machine Gun Battalion, which saw active service on the western front. After returning home from Camp Jackson, S. C., where he was discharged, his parents were notified that he had been wounded, his name appear ing in the casualty list from Washington under date of April 13, "Bob" says he never felt better in his life and is wondering where his injury was received.

Soon after war was declared both of these men entered the service, Major Bulwinkle, then captain, going with Company B. Infantry, known as the Gaston Gnards, while Captain Cherry organized a unachine gun unit of cavalry, composed of Gaston county men, later designated as Company A. 115th Machine Gun Battalion. Major Bulwinkle was later transferred to and assisted in the organization of the 113th Field Artillery, which was composed of North Carolinians. Both officers saw active service with the 30th Division in the A. E. F.
