YESTERDAY'S TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

(By International News Service.)

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Germany's debt to the United States is one hundred million dollars and it will not be entirely cancelled by the turning over of 42 ships seized upon the occasion of America's entry into the war.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The administration rule that American shipbuilders cannot accept foreign contracts will be revoked within 48 hours, it was announced today by Congressman Britton, who refused to give the source of his information but it is believed it came from President Wilson.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—A growing confidence and improvement in the general trade and industrial conditions throughout the country is reported almost without an exception by the Federal Reserve agents for April. Business prospects are improved, retail trade has increased, prices have assumed a more stable position and business generally is considered on a stronger and better footing. The floating supply of labor has

been partially absorbed by the prospect of a large grain crop which promises still further opportunities for the use of the entire labor supply.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Asserting that L. C. Martens, self-styled representative of the Russian soviet government in the United States, has not been recognized as such, the State Department this afternoon warned against representations made by any one purporting to represent that government.

PARIS, May 6.—President Wilson won a sweeping victory today when Premier Lloyd George and Clemenceau were forced to acquiesce in the proposal that 45 newspaper correspondents be present at the Trinquet palace at Versailles to witness the presentation of the peace treaty to the Germans. The President personally urged this publicity. Those present will be five representatives from each of the big powers, the same number of Germans and the remainder from the smaller nations.

MILAN, May 6.—The Budapest soviet has refused to accept the resignation of Bela Kun. The communist government has decided to resist the Entente forces, says a Budapest dispatch today. A general mobilization of the proletariat has been ordered.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—A cable call for an extraordinary session of the next Congress is momentarily expected today. The date has not been revealed but it is expected to be either May 26th or June 2nd.

COLUMBUS, OHIO, May 6.—Ten are known to be dead and 11 seriously burned in a six-story apartment house fire at 75 1-2 West Broad street in the center of the city, early this morning. The victims are three men, three women and four children. The injured are three men and six women. Two or three children are unaccounted for. The occupants were trapped by the flames shooting up the elevator shaft from the second floor, turning the upper floors into a veritable furnace. The victim's screams as the fire enveloped them horrified the crowd of spectators. Women tossed babies and children into nets below. Some jumped to death or life-long crippleddom. The death list may reach 15.

PARIS, May 6.—At a secret plenary session of the peace conference today the final reading of the treaty will take place. All the Allied nations are represented except Italy. The Italians will arrive Wednesday. The entire assemblage is pledged to secrecy.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—The Polish troops attempted to capture Vilna but failed. The town is still held by Bolsheviks, says a cablegram this afternoon from Paris. There is a protest against the Polish invasion to the peace confer-

ence by the Lithuanian government.

FLORENCE, ALA., May 6.—Florence Hansborough, aged 13, daughter of the editor of The Tri-Cities Daily in Sheffield, was drowned in a bathtub this morning. She was discovered by her mother after a short absence.

—Mrs. Mattie J. Moore leaves this week for Edgemont, where she will spend the summer.

—A train of 23 large army trucks and three automobiles passed through Gastonia Monday afternoon en route from Raleigh to Atlanta.
