### GOVERNMENT SLEUTHS AFTER BOMB PLOTTERS.

(By International News Service.)

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Every governmental agency is today working in an attempt to pin down the perpetrators of the second nation-wide bomb plot within five weeks. The following are among the bomb explosions occurring within the last 24 hours: Judge Charles' residence, out of town, New York, exploded, man and woman passing blown to atoms; building occupied by Isaac Cohen and Moses Morris and their families in Patterson, N. J., exploded; Attorney General Palmer's Washington residence badly damaged, believed that two were killed; Justice Hand's home in Boston, damaged; house near Federal Judge Thompson's residence, Pittsburg, damaged; the rectory of Victory parish and the residence of Louis Jurgens in Philadelphia, damaged, several injured; residence of May Davis, in Cleveland, damaged; home of Representative Boyers at Newtonville, Mass., damaged.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The police today practically established the fact that the man who attempted to take the life of Attorney General Palmer came from Philadelphia by train. The hat check of the inflammatory anarchist Dodge, found near the remains of the victim near the Palmer residence, is identical with one found near the Hayden home in Boston. Development today indicates that the Palmer bomb exploded before it was placed where it was intended. The homes of all cabinet members, Secretary Tamm and others are guarded today.

### WOULD EXCLUDE COLORED WOMEN FROM SUFFRAGE.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The equal suffrage amendment was brought up in the Senate this afternoon and it is planned to consider it until it is disposed of. Senator Harrison offered an amendment providing that suffrage be granted only to white women and demanded a vote.

### SAYS UNION OPERATIVES MUST BE REINSTATED.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—An appeal for an investigation of the Atlanta telephone strike by an unbiased tribunal was made in a telegram from Mayor Key to Congressman Upshaw today. Mr. Upshaw replied that Mr. Barleson stated that such an investigation is being made and that the operatives dismissed for union affiliations must be reinstated with full pay for time lost.

### MUST GET WORLD BACK TO WORK SAYS WILSON.

(By International News Service.)

PARIS, June 3.—Following a meeting at the Hotel Crillon this morning with, and the entry of the personnel of the American peace mission, there was called an immediate conference of the British, French, Italian and American experts in an endeavor to secure a compromise agreement whereby a concerted front may be presented to the German demands for the benefit of the peace treaty. The object is to secure an early signing of peace.

Mr. Wilson said, "Time is now the greatest essential. We must all get the world back to work. It is necessary that America mediate the mooted problems, secure an agreement with the French and British and then insist that Germany accept the treaty. The British and Americans are demanding radical changes in the treaty. France is opposing that. It is sanctioning America's action. The United States commission is thereby faced with the greatest task undertaken yet but all five members hope a full agreement will be reached soon."
