BREWING INTERESTS DIE HARD.

(By International News Service.) WASHINGTON, July 11.—The present war-time prohibition bills before congress are unworthy and insincere, Samuel Untermyer, attorney, declared today before the prohibition subcommittee of the Senate. "Search and seizure should be included, since as the bills now stand they provide class legislation allowing the rich to stock up, denying the poor the right to buy," he declared. To eliminate the saloon, Congress must prohibit the sale of all liquors containing any alcohol under war-time prohibition law. He stated that he represented the British brewing interests, who have 40 million dollars invested in the United States, and brewing interests in general.

CECIL PREDICTS CRISIS.

Believes Europe on Verge of a Financial Disaster.

London, July 8.—Lord Robert Cecil in Parliament today said he believed that Europe was on the verge of a financial disaster of a magnitude they might get through or they might not. The news from Italy, he said, looked exceedingly bad.

Any one, said Lord Robert, who at present really squandered money was doing a very serious injury to the welfare of his country. He did not wish, as had been suggested, to see the complicated machinery of the Board of Trade used for restrictions on imports employed more than was absolutely necessary.

Girl Who Had Never Uttered a Sound Screams When Struck by Train.
