BREWING INTERESTS DIE HARD.

WASHINGTON, July 11.- "The preent war-time prohibition bills before congress are unworthy and insincere," Samrel Untermyer, attorney, declared today before the prohibition subcommittee of the Senate. "Search and seizure should be included, since as the bills now stand they provide class legislation allowing the rich to stock up, denying the poor the right to buy," he declared. To climinate the saloon, Congress must prohibit cohol under war-time prohibition law. He stated that he represented the British brewing interests, who have 40 million dollars invested in the United States, and brewing interests in general.
